The sum paid for the carriage of interprovincial and intercolonial mails by unsubsidized vessels was £3,839 16s. 9d.

3,713 private boxes were let, which, together with the fees on 243 private bags, produced a revenue of £3,660 11s. 2d.

The total number of miles travelled in connection with the conveyance of the inland mails was 2,902,594. The total cost of the inland services was $\pounds 24,808$ 18s. 6d., and the cost per mile 2.05d. In 1881 the expenditure on the inland mail services was $\pounds 23,334$ 18s., and in 1880 $\pounds 35,062$ 1s. 1d.

The net cost of the San Francisco and Brindisi services was $\pounds 4,176$ 5s. 9d. and $\pounds 4,715$ 3s. respectively.
