degree of accuracy. The five Forms appear to be well classified, and the ordinary studies of a school of this class are carried on with diligence. More attention is paid to English reading than is usual in grammar schools, and my impression is that a good result is being attained by it—that it quickens the intelligence and promotes facility of composition, besides improving the boys' elocution. "Technical" education is represented here by the workshop referred to in the headmaster's statement printed in the parliamentary paper issued this year on that subject.
