<sup>(</sup>a) As from the 1st April, 1947, the hospital levy on local authorities has been limited to 0·5d. in the pound (Finance Act (No. 2), 1946, section 15). This has resulted in the amount of subsidies being substantially increased. From estimates supplied by Hospital Boards it is apparent that the amount required for subsidies for 1948-49 will be substantially in excess of the amount paid during 1947-48. The increase arises from increased salaries paid to hospital employees and increased cost of materials.
