DEATH OF HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH AND OF SAXE-COBURG AND GOTHA

(JOINT LETTER FROM HIGH COMMISSIONER OF CANADA AND AGENTS-GENERAL OF THE SELF-GOVERNING COLONIES ADDRESSED TO HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN, EXPRESSING REGRET AND RESPECTFUL CONDOLENCES ON THE).

The great affliction which your Majesty has sustained has caused profound sorrow in the colonies, as well as in the United Kingdom, and your Majesty's grief will be shared by your faithful subjects in every part of your Empire.
