The lambing was above the average.
 The export of mutton and lamb decreased by 668,749 carcases. According to the agricultural and pastoral statistics for 1904-5, cattle showed a further increase of 143,303.

It is confidentally anticipated that the flocks will continue to show a steady increase, as farmers are now realising the necessity for holding back a proportion of ewe lambs for breeding purposes.
