I have the honour to inform you, in reference to your despatch, No. 166, A.-2, 1918, No. 25. dated the 22nd October, 1917, that instructions have been issued so that the masters of all British ships, whether on Government service or not, may be advised in regard to the procedure to be followed in making marine protests.
