Some of the petitioners in this case are already included in the lists for one or more islands, or are entitled to come in as successors to original grantees. Others, recognizing that the gazetted owners strongly oppose their inclusion in the Titi Islands, now intimate that they will be quite satisfied with permits to go to one or other of the Crown islands. Other petitioners, again, seek to get birdcatching privileges for their brothers, sisters, and children as well as for themselves. As many were included in the lists of 1910 as the results of conferences, consultations, and compromises rather than through evidence adduced to show ancestral right and occupation, it is somewhat difficult to ascertain the principles and bases upon which the lists were ultimately compiled.

Taking the petitioners individually, or in conjunction with their brothers and sisters who can claim

equal rights though not signing the petition, I submit the following recommendations:-
