Personal

Mr. H. L. Cummings, Superintending Engineer, General Post Office, retired on superannuation on the 3rd December, after completing over thirty-seven years' service. He was succeeded by Mr. J. McDermott, District Telegraph Engineer, Wellington; Mr. McDermott in turn being succeeded by Mr. E. H. Lawn, Telegraph Engineer, Wellington. Mr. E. C. Gage, Superintending Engineer, General Post Office, also retired on superannuation

Mr. E. C. Gage, Superintending Engineer, General Post Office, also retired on superannuation during the year. Mr. Gage, who had formerly occupied the position of District Telegraph Engineer, Auckland, for a number of years, severed his connection with the Department on the 30th November. He had over thirty-seven years' service to his credit.

REDUCTION IN SALARIES.

A further reduction in the salaries and wages of officers and employees of the Department was made on the 1st April, 1932, under the provisions of the National Expenditure Adjustment Act of that year. The reduction on this occasion was on a graduated scale, the minimum being 5 per cent. and the maximum $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

CHANGE OF CONTROL.

During the year the clerical staffs of the telephone sections of the Engineers' offices at the four chief centres who deal with the telephone-exchange subscribers' accounts were transferred to the control of the respective Chief Postmasters. The system of control of this branch is now uniform throughout the Dominion.

APPEAL BOARD.

The Post and Telegraph Appeal Board, under the Chairmanship of Mr. E. C. Cutten, the Senior Stipendiary Magistrate at Auckland, sat on two occasions during the year. Seventy-seven appeals from forty-two officers were adjudicated upon, with the following results: Withdrawn, six; did not lie, four; disallowed, sixty-seven.

Sittings of the Board were held at Auckland and Wellington.

DEPARTMENTAL CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL.

Officers to the number of 701 enrolled during the year in the Departmental Correspondence School, which provides tuition for those who desire to sit for departmental examinations. Twenty-one separate instructional courses are available. Officers generally have profited greatly by the provision of facilities for study, and the value of the tuition given is reflected in all branches of the Service by an increase in efficiency.
