NOTICE.

THE following Rules and Regulations for the better management of the Stores in this department, having been approved by his Honor the Superintendent, on the 26th February, 1874, are published for the information and guidance of the members of the Canterbury Constabulary Force.

GENERAL STORE.

1. Accommodation shall be set apart at the Depôt, to be known as the General Store, and this branch of the department shall be under the management of the Storekeeper, who shall be responsible to the Accountant for the proper discharge of the duties of his office, and all matters pertaining thereto; and the Accountant shall be responsible to the Commissioner.

2. The Storekeeper shall be exempt from all other departmental duties, and shall in every instance receive orders as to the duties of his office direct from the Accountant, and all communications to or from the Storekeeper on any subject shall be forwarded direct to the Commissioner.

3. The Storekeeper shall at all times appear in plain clothes, except under special instructions from the Commissioner.

4. No articles are to be received into Store, or issued therefrom without the authority of the Commissioner, and during office hours.

5. When it is found necessary to issue articles from the Store which should appear on the Parchment Certificates held by the members of the Force, it will be necessary for the Storekeeper to make the entry previous to the issue; and in every instance to submit the certificate for the inspection of the Officer in charge of the Store before returning it to the original holder.

6. When stores are required which can be obtained in the out districts, the member of the Force in charge will forward a list with the requisition, showing the current prices for each article of the best quality of its kind, in order that the cheapest way of supplying the articles may be adopted.

DISTRICT STORES.

1. Every member of the Force entrusted with the custody of supplies is to keep a clear and correct account of every article which may in any manner be placed under his charge, and is to be particularly attentive to the preservation of the supplies.

2. No articles whatever are to be lent, sold, or exchanged, except under the authority in writing of the Commissioner.

3. All articles in District Stores should be constantly under observation, and should be frequently inspected in detail. The contents of each package should at all times be correctly noted in conspicuous characters on a label attached to the package itself.

4. The member of the Force immediately in charge should each month inspect the Stores under his charge, and see that due order and regularity are maintained.

5. Every exertion must be made to ensure the forage being stored in such a manner as to prevent any injury through the effects of weather or other causes; and should any damage or loss occur the strictest investigation is to be made, and the person who from negligence or culpability allowed the same to take place is to be held personally liable for it.

6. Proper precautions against loss by fire are in all cases to be taken.

7. On the first of July, and on the first of January in each year, and oftener if considered necessary, the stock on hand, whether of stores or forage, is to be ascertained by the member of the Force in charge by actual tally and inspection, and is to be reconciled with the balance as shown in the stock account.

8. Whenever Government Stores are received to replace similar articles worn out, the unserviceable as well as the serviceable articles should be placed on the inventory, and a note made in the column of remarks showing their condition, until condemned by an officer, when the condemned articles should be removed from the list and the fact mentioned in the column of remarks. The attention of Officers visiting stations should

be drawn to any articles which may be worn out or unfit for further use, or which may require repairs.

9. When the person who may have charge is removed from any station, he is to balance his accounts, and to take care that the stock handed over to his successor is correct. In like manner the person taking charge is to ascertain that the stock on hand is in all respects the same as that shown by the accounts, and should any discrepancies be afterwards discovered, he will be held responsible. When practicable, the person retiring, and the person relieving him should go through the stock at the same time, and certify conjointly to the correctness of the books, and inventories of property.

10. The foregoing Regulations shall be read and construed with and as part of the regulations which appear in the "Manual of Police Regulations," for the guidance of the Canterbury Constabulary Force, framed under the third clause of an "Ordinance to provide for the establishment and maintenance of a Constabulary Force, Session VII., No. 2."
