1. COMMUNICATIONS.—*When members of the Force find it necessary to communicate officially by telegram or otherwise, with persons outside boundaries of this Province, the communication must be forwarded through the head of this department; and all communications received by members of the Force under similar circumstances should be forwarded with the necessary information forthwith to him; and all persons in this and the adjacent colonies, communicating officially with the Canterbury Police, are requested to address the Commissioner of Police, Christchurch.*

2. POLICE GAZETTE.—*Communications for this GAZETTE should be addressed to the COMMISSIONER OF POLICE, prepaid; they must be of Police interest, or no notice will be taken of them. Officers in charge of stations are requested to report to the Commissioner of Police every instance of the non-delivery of the GAZETTE, and to suggest from time to time such alterations in the addresses and in the mode of transmission as may be considered necessary.*

3. WARRANTS.—*Whenever it is desired that any individual, whose name is given, shall be apprehended, it should be stated in the advertisement for the GAZETTE whether or not a warrant has been issued for the apprehension of the Offender. When a warrant has not been issued in the first instance, any subsequent report announcing the issue of a warrant should refer to it in the POLICE GAZETTE.*

4. NAMES.—*It is particularly requested that in all Informations the names of persons and places may be spelt correctly, and written legibly, the Christian name being given with the*

Surname, and written in full, to prevent mistakes.

Stolen.

STOLEN from South Rakaia on the 29th ultimo, a pair of leading chains, value 20s., the property of James Patterson. Identifiable.

STOLEN from Ashburton Livery Stables, between 11.30 a.m. and 7 p.m. 29th ultimo, an old light grey overcoat, double-breasted; a muffler in one of the pockets, the property of Walter Spring, of Southbridge. Identifiable.

STOLEN from the Office, which was broken into, at the Waikuku Wool Works, on the 28th ultimo, the sum of two shillings and fourpence, not identifiable, the property of Thomas McDonald. Some of the new hands recently engaged are suspected.

STOLEN from a heap of stones on the North Road, where it had been placed on the 3rd instant during some repairs which were going on, a square tin stable lamp, with three faces of glass and tin back, two wire guards on each glass, the property of Richard Evans, Girder Bridge. Identifiable.

STOLEN from Windwhistle, about the middle

of March last, sixty or seventy yards of fencing wire, not identifiable, the property of Thomas Phillips, Point Station. William Lee, of Hororata Valley is suspected.

STOLEN from Waltham between 4.30 p.m. 3rd, and 7.30 a.m. 4th instants, a pair of cart blinkers with double brass buckles, bearing rein broken and tied with a piece of string; the bit and chain to the rein made of galvanized iron, the property of Robert Thomson, of Waltham. Identifiable.

STOLEN between Dunsandel and Rakaia, sometime during the last seven months, thirteen rails from around the Government ballast pits, the property of the Provincial Government. Not identifiable.

STOLEN from the Somerset Hotel, Ashburton, between 2 and 4 p.m. on the 5th inst. a pair of stirrup leathers nearly new. Two or three holes cut in them for the purpose of shortening when required, also a pair of stirrup irons, identifiable, the property of Frederick Bossenburg, who suspects a jockey named Thomas Parkinson, supposed colonial native, about 17 years, 5ft 4 or 5in., freckled complexion, thin features, who went per coach to Timaru on the 5th instant.

LOST or Stolen between 11.30 p.m. on the 4th and 5 a.m. on the 5th instant, in Christchurch, a silver $\frac{3}{4}$ plate Geneva watch, No. 6006, with gold hands; and between £3 and £4 in notes and silver, the property of George Stevens, who was drinking heavily. Watch only identifiable.

STOLEN from the Mount Somers Road, Ashburton, between 6 and 8 a.m. on the 25th ult., a set of leading harness, nearly new, very heavy chain traces; one of the hooks having been broken and mended is much smaller than the other. A piece of a shovel handle was used as a spreader; value £2; the property of Thomas Greenaway, Bullock town, Ashburton. Identifiable.

STOLEN from the Ophanage, Lyttelton, during the night of the 3rd inst., £3 1s., cash, four red blankets, one box inlaid New Zealand wood, containing a flute, one quart bottle mounted in silver, with handsome silver mounted cork stopper, containing whiskey, the property of Mr. Giraud, master of the Orpanage. Box, bottle, and flute identifiable.

STOLEN from Gardiner's stables, Timaru, about 2.30 p.m. on the 6th inst., a black cloth Inverness cloak, not much worn, with long cape, value 15s. the property of William Warne, of Pleasant Point.

GEORGE BARRIE *alias* Selwyn, *vide* *Police Gazette* 1874, No. 24, page 179, is charged on warrant filed in Commissioner's office, with disobeying an order of the Resident Magistrate's Court, Christchurch, to support his family.

Inquests.

On the 10th of April, 1875, an inquest was held by M. Studholme, Esq., at Deep Creek (Timaru District), on the body of Thomas Brien, aged 38 years, a carter. Deceased in company with his brother, was driving a team along the North Road (both being under the influence of liquor), when about four miles from Waimate the dray of deceased capsized and fell upon him; his brother endeavoured to free him, but could not do so till life was extinct. The jury returned a verdict of—"Accidental death," and expressed an opinion that his brother (George Brien), was to blame in not reporting the matter sooner, and in neglecting to get a medical man on the spot; they also suggested to the police the desirability of taking in charge persons in charge of teams who appear to be intoxicated.

An inquest was held at the Hospital, Christchurch, on April 16, 1875, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of a female child, the daughter of Allan and Janet McKinley, aged 14 days. The mother of deceased had been in a state of drunkenness for some days, in consequence of which the child was neglected. The *post mortem* examination shewed that the child died from dirt and want of nourishment. The jury returned a verdict of—"Manslaughter" against Janet McKinley. The father of the child was in gaol at the time of its death.

An inquest was held at St. Asaph street, Christchurch, on the 18th of April, 1875, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of a male infant, aged 8 days, of which Aubrey William and Clara Martin were the parents. Deceased had been circumcised on the day of his death which was caused by shock to the system and loss of

blood. The jury returned a verdict of—"Accidental death," and requested the Coroner to caution Aubrey Martin (the father) against circumcising his children without medical aid.

AN inquest was held on the 24th April, 1875, at Lee's Bush, Oxford, before J. R. Gorton, Esq., J.P., Acting Coroner, upon the body of Robert Garlick, aged 16 years, a labourer. The evidence showed that the deceased was engaged with his father in felling a tree, when the head of a maul which the latter was using flew off and struck deceased on the left temple, which ultimately produced death from effusion of blood on the brain. The jury returned a verdict of—"Death from natural causes."

AN inquest was held on the 13th April, 1875, at Waitaki, before B. Woolcombe, Esq., R.M., Coroner, upon the body of Philip Smith, aged 32 years, a ferryman. The evidence showed that on the 28th March, 1875, deceased, in company with another man named William Miller, crossed from the north to the south side of the Waitaki river; on returning they chose a new ford, and in trying to retrace his steps deceased fell from the horse into the river, and was not seen until April 10th, when his body was found in a decomposed state on the beach between the Pareora and Otaio rivers. The jury returned a verdict of—"Death from accidental drowning by falling off his horse when crossing the Waitaki river."

AN inquest was held on the 26th day of April, 1875, before B. Woolcombe, Esq., R.M., Coroner, at Peel Forest, upon the body of James Alice Ritchie, aged 3 months. The deceased was attacked with diarrhoea on Thursday the 22nd instant, and died at 2.30 p.m. on the day following. The jury returned a verdict of—"Death from natural causes brought on by diarrhoea."

ON the 27th April, 1875, an inquest was held at Ashburton before H. J. Winter, Esq., J.P., upon the body of James Brown, aged 28 years, a labourer. The evidence shewed that deceased, in company with a man named Brankin, left the Spread Eagle hotel, at 11 p.m. on April 24th, both being the worse for liquor; at 7.30 a.m. on the 25th, the former was found on the road side about 700 yards from the hotel, and stated that he had fallen from the top of a load of wood (which was in his dray), on to his head. He was removed to the Spread Eagle, where he died on the 26th at 6 p.m. The jury returned a verdict of—"Accidental death."

AN inquest was held at Warmatah on the 27th of April, 1875, before B. Woolcombe, Esq., R.M., Coroner, upon the body of Robert Fergusson, aged 40 years, a labourer. Deceased had, whilst in a state of intoxication, lain down upon some straw in a stable belonging to a man named Hugh Campbell, near Timaru, where he was found soon afterwards lying on his face, dead. The medical

evidence showed that the heart and liver were diseased, and the stomach congested, which, with the position in which he was lying, produced death. Verdict—"Died by suffocation while under the influence of drink."

AN Inquest was held on May 10, at Akaroa, before J. Aylmer, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of Mary Hughes, aged 40 years. The evidence showed that deceased was taken suddenly ill on the 8th instant, and was found dead in bed at 6.30 a.m. on the 9th. The jury returned a verdict of—"Death from heart disease."

AN inquest was held on the 8th May, in Lichfield street, Christchurch, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., upon the body of Johanna Mulluza, aged 40 years. The medical evidence showed that the heart, liver, and kidneys were diseased. Verdict—"Death from natural causes."

AN inquest was held on the 8th May, 1875, before B. Woolcombe, Esq., R.M., Coroner, upon the body of Thomas Bruce, aged 37 years, a labourer. The medical testimony showed that deceased had ruptured one of the main blood vessels in the chest, and a verdict of—"Death from natural causes" was returned.

AN inquest was held at Mount Harding, on the 10th May, before H. F. Winter, Esq., J.P., upon the body of John Haurabau, aged 43 years, a labourer. On the 5th instant deceased complained that he felt unwell, and vomited some blood, upon the night of the 6th he still complained; and on the morning of the 7th was found dead in his bed. Verdict—"Death from natural causes."

AN inquest was held on the 28th day of April, 1875, at Sneyd's street, Kaiapoi, before C. Dudley, Esq., J.P., upon the body of a female child, aged 4 weeks, and the daughter of Thomas and Harriett Hassal. The jury returned a verdict of—"Accidental suffocation."

AN inquest was held on the 3rd May, at Courtenay, before W. B. Tosswill, Esq., J.P., upon the body of Gifford Thomas Kingdon, aged 8 years. The evidence showed that deceased, in company with his brother Henry, aged 12 years, was driving a horse in a dray from a paddock on to the main road; Henry Kingdon got down to open the gate, leaving the deceased in the dray with the reins in his hand; when the gate was opened a little way the horse walked on, bringing the dray in contact with a fence, the dray was overturned and deceased was thrown out, the horse falling upon and crushing him.

AN inquest was held on the 7th May, in the Gaol at Lyttelton, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of John Mercer. The jury found a verdict of—"Death by hanging according to law."
