Stolen.

STOLEN from Kaiapoi, between the evening of the 9th and the morning of the 18th ult., a black and white sheep dog, small tan spots over each eye, tan feet, white tip to tail, answers to name of "Tip;" registered collar, No. 334, the property of Frank Merton, value £20. Identifiable.

STOLEN at Pleasant Point, between the 10th and 26th ult., one £5 note, bank or number unknown, the property of William Hill, not identifiable. George Hart, English, 25 years, 5ft. 8in., medium build, fair complexion, light small beard and moustache, grey tweed sac coat, moleskin trowsers, light billycock hat, watertight boots, still at Pleasant Point, is suspected.

STOLEN from Ashburton, between the 22nd and 24th ult., a tent, 10ft. x 8ft., made of No. 2 or 3 canvass, may be branded A.R.B., made by a man in Temuka, cost £7 12s. 6d. Identifiable. The property of the Ashburton Road Board; Gilmore and his men suspected.

Mount Thomas and Loburn plains, is suspected.

STOLEN at Kakahu road, near Temuka, between the 13th and 27th ult., 29 sheets of galvanised iron, Gospel Oak brand, 6ft. sheets, value £8 10s., the property of Samuel Brenaley. Identification doubtful.

Stolen from the Prince of Wales hotel, Christchurch, between 2.30 and 4 p.m. 8th instant, two red crimean shirts with black spots, some paper sewn on the tails of the shirts with price 12s. 6d. marked on them; one pair black cloth trowsers and vest, waistband of trowsers and left side of vest marked with initials R. J. E. B.; and one black silk scarf, similarly marked, the property of R. J. E. Baxter, value £3 2s. 9d. Identifiable.

STOLEN from the room of a house being built in Barbadoes street, Christchurch, during the night of the 3rd instant, three 7-inch door locks, one draw-lock, eight pairs 3-inch butt hinges, one pair of 4-inch ditto; nine sets window hinges, one cast-iron floor cramp, one brass door handle, three brass keys, and one brass handle, scutcheons, not identifiable, the property of Joseph Brunt. John Lee, a carpenter well known in Christchurch, and still here, is suspected.

STOLEN from the Devonshire Arms Hotel, on the 2nd instant, a brown double-breasted overcoat, black velvet collar, two side pockets, and ticket pocket, value, about 25s., the property of James Mooran. Identification doubtful. A man supposed to have gone to Timaru, about 25 years of age, 5ft. 10in., stout built, clean shaved, wore a suit of light tweed clothes, is suspected.

STOLEN from Porter's Pass on the 5th March last, a light bay draught mare, blaze down face, hind feet white, long tail, off hock capped, branded **S** near shoulder, the property of Robert McKay. Identifiable.

STOLEN from the shop of James Young, watchmaker, Waimate, during the night of the 5th instant, one set greenstone brooch and earring value £5, one greenstone brooch value £2 15s., one greenstone brooch value £2 2s., one gold locket large size value £2 10s., one gold brooch value £2 6s., one pair earrings, dark coloured stone in each, value £2 5s., one pair plain earrings value £1 15s., three English gold lockets value £4, three pairs Colonial gold earrings value £3 5s., five ladies' dress rings English gold, 9 carat, value £4 10s. Show glass 12 by 9 inches, value £1. Total £31 9s. Identifiable.

THE undermentioned seamen are charged on warrant filed in the Commissioner's office with deserting from the ship "Cicero" in Lyttelton Harbour during the night of the 2nd instant. Captain Raymond offers £2 2s. each for their apprehension. Symonds, English, 20 years of age, 5ft. 5 or 6in., fair complexion, pale face, no whiskers,

beard or moustache. J. Williams, English, 24 years of age, 5ft. 7 or 8in., fresh complexion, dark hair and moustache. W. McDonald, Scotch, 24 years of age, 5ft. 8in., dark complexion, dark moustache and imperial; all dressed in sailors' clothes. They took the ship's boat which has not yet been recovered.

JOHN DALTON, farm labourer, native of Yorkshire, England, 22 years of age, 5ft. 8 or 9in., stout build, dark hair, long face, fair complexion, fair whiskers and beard, small fair moustache, slouching gait, fond of talking to children, dressed in light tweed suit, is charged on a warrant filed in the Commissioner's office, with neglecting to provide for his illegitimate child of which Eliza Page, of Springston, is the mother.

WILLIAM SELWYN, English, labourer, 29 or 30 years of age, 5ft. 6 or 7in., stout build, very dark hair, beard, whiskers, and moustache, ruddy complexion, dark blue eyes, generally dressed in dark clothes, is charged on warrant filed in the Commissioner's office, with neglecting to provide the support of his illegitimate child of which Ellen Niven is mother. Offender is supposed to have gone to Auckland.

THE undermentioned men are charged with deserting from H. M. ships "Dido" and "Rosario," at Auckland, on the 2nd instant. Captain Chapman offers a reward of £3 for each man. Thomas Delicate, blacksmith, 30 years, 5ft. 10in., pale complexion, light hair, whiskers, beard, and moustache, sharp features. Peter Wattey, caulker, H. M. S. "Rosario," 5ft. 10in., brown hair, dark complexion, short dark whiskers, beard and moustache, scar on left wrist. They are supposed to have come South.

A WARRANT of commitment for want of distress, against William Robinson, English, about 26 years, 5ft. 7in., slight build, fair complexion, sandy hair, whiskers, beard, and moustache, smart appearance, dressed in brown tweed suit, and black billycock hat, is filed in the Commissioner's office. Offender, who violently assaulted Thomas Dorn, barman at the City Hotel, on the 18th May last, is supposed to have gone North.

SOMETIME between the 20th and 22nd ultimo, a small freestone figure of the Virgin Mary was removed from the grave of James Hannon's child in the Roman Catholic Cemetery, Christchurch. Mrs. Maloney, the sexton's wife, is suspected of having done it out of spite.

SOMETIME between 6 p.m. on the 3rd and 10 p.m. on the 4th instant, a blacksmith's bellows valued at £2 10s., the property of James Ernest, Temuka, was cut on both sides so as to render it almost useless.

Missing Friends.

ENQUIRY is made for F. L. Montagu, a landscape painter, and artist in oil colours, a little over 5ft. high, well built, large dark eyes, nose slightly turned to the left, small mole on right side of face, and two on the left, one directly above the other, full beard and moustache; is in the habit of disposing of his works by art union; has a wife and four children residing in the neighbourhood of Cooke's river, near Sydney, New South Wales. Information to be sent to the Commissioner of the Police, Christchurch.

Inquests.

AN inquest was held on the 15th May, 1875, at Christchurch, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., Coroner, upon the body of Austin Fussell, aged 34 years, a chemist, who at about 3.20 p.m. on the 10th of May, went into the storeroom at the back of his shop in Colombo street, Christchurch, and was shortly afterwards found lying insensible upon the floor. He remained in this state until his death, which occurred at noon on the 14th. Medical testimony proved that death resulted from injuries to the head by a fall from a ladder on to an asphalt floor. Verdict—"Accidental death."

ON the 15th May last, an inquest was held at Christchurch Hospital, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., Coroner, upon the body of Joseph Thompson, aged 45, a labourer. The evidence shewed that deceased who had been employed at the Dunsandel Railway Station, was on the 13th struck on the head with an iron bark log, which fell from a crane, the chain of which had broken. Verdict—"Accidental death."

ON the 17th May, 1875, an inquest was held at Christchurch, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., Coroner, upon the body of Joseph Betts, aged 44, a plasterer, who was found drowned at 3.30 p.m. on the 15th in the river "Avon" between Colombo and Victoria Bridges. There were no marks of violence on the body, and the evidence shewed that deceased had been at one time

an inmate of an inebriate asylum. The jury returned a verdict of—"Found drowned."

ON the 17th May, an inquest was held at Southbridge, before Charles J. Bridge, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of Annie Spring, aged 27 years, matron. The medical testimony proved that deceased had died from inflammation and congestion of the bowels, and bursting of a blood vessel in the stomach, brought on by excessive drinking. Verdict—"Died from excessive drinking."

ON the 20th May, 1875, an inquest was held at Lyttelton, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., upon the body of John Black, aged 24 years, a seaman. The medical testimony proved that deceased (who had fallen down on the footpath and died immediately) suffered from heart disease which caused his death. Verdict—"Death from natural causes."

ON the 24th May, 1875, an inquest was held before B. Woolcombe, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of John Sullivan, aged 34, a farmer, who on the 22nd had been thrown from his horse and received a fracture of the skull, and died on the 23rd. Verdict—"Accidental death by a fall from his horse."

ON the 27th May, 1875, an inquest was held at the Christchurch Hospital, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., upon the body of William Williams, aged 34, a seaman. The evidence showed that deceased had been seized with apoplexy on the 25th, on board the Alhambra at Lyttelton, and ordered to the Christchurch Hospital by Dr. McDonald of that place, while travelling by train in care of acting Sergeant Maguire, he suddenly expired. Medical testimony showed that death was caused by apoplexy. Verdict accordingly.

AN inquest was held 28th May, 1875, at Christchurch, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., upon the body of Charles Wedge, aged 60, a labourer. The evidence showed that deceased was subject to epileptic fits, and was last seen alive at 8.20 p.m. on the 26th; at 8 a.m. on the 27th he was found dead in a creek in Salisbury street east. Verdict—"Found drowned."

AN inquest was held on the 29th May, 1875, at Timaru, before B. Woolcombe, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of Arthur Gascoigne, aged 36, a carter. The evidence showed that deceased was thrown from his dray (the wheel of which passed over and broke his leg) while under the influence of drink, on the 25th. He died in the hospital on the 28th. Verdict—"Accidentally falling from his dray while in a state of drink, and the dray wheel passing over his leg and breaking it."

ON the 31st ultimo, an inquest was held at Timaru, before B. Woolcombe, Esq., J.P., upon the body of Harry Thorpe, aged 25, a wool sorter. The evidence showed that deceased was travelling from the South, on the night

of the 28th, on horseback, and under the influence of drink. When at "Pig Hunting Creek," he missed the ford, got into deep water and was drowned. Verdict—"Accidental drowning."

On the 2nd June an inquest was held at Christchurch, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., Coroner, upon the body of William Bennett, aged 28, a labourer. The medical testimony showed that deceased had the left leg fractured and a lacerated wound upon it, caused by the falling upon him of some iron bark logs, at the Dunsandel Railway Station, through the breaking of the chain of a steam crane, the injuries to his leg resulted in death. A verdict of—"Accidental death" was returned.

An inquest was held on the 4th day of June, 1875, at Christchurch, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of Napier Gordon Glassford, aged 42, accountant. The evidence showed that deceased was driving a buggy along Oxford Terrace, when the horses shied and bolted, throwing him out with great force upon the road, and fracturing his skull, which resulted in death. Verdict—"Accidental death."

On the 7th instant an inquest was held at Leeston, before Charles J. Bridge, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of Charles Dobbin, aged 40, a farmer. The medical evidence showed that deceased died from contusion of the brain caused by a fall from his horse. A verdict of—"Accidental death" was returned.

On the 7th instant, an inquest was held at Timaru, before B. Woolcombe, Esq., Coroner, upon the body of Robert Ward, aged 44, a farmer. The evidence showed that deceased was returning from Timaru to Mount Horrible, and when about a mile from that place a gate which stands across the public road, and which he had just opened, swung back and so struck the dray in which he was sitting as to capsize it upon him and produce almost instant death from suffocation. A verdict of—"Death from suffocation" was returned, with a rider that the Coroner be requested to take steps to have the gate removed, and to call the attention of the authorities to the danger of such obstructions."

An inquest was held at on the 8th June, at Ashburton, before C. Percy Cox, Esq., upon the body of Joseph Armstrong, aged 40, a gardener. The evidence led to the supposition that deceased, who was returning to his home from Mount Somers on the night of the 5th, lost the track and wandered to a swamp, where he was found dead on the 6th instant. Verdict—"Accidental death from exposure."

An inquest was held on the 9th instant, at Lyttelton, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., J.P., upon the body of Robert Edis

Protheroe, aged 35, a seaman. The medical evidence showed that death resulted from heart disease, and a verdict was returned of—"Death from natural causes."

An inquest was held on the 12th instant, at Ashburton, before H. J. Winter, Esq., J.P., upon the bodies of three men whose names are unknown, but who are herein described. From the evidence, it was found that on the evening of June 10th, a man named Choat was walking along the beach, about two miles south of the mouth of the Ashburton river, when he saw the wreck of a small vessel, above water mark, and close by her the body of a white man. Further search discovered the bodies of two maoris, and near the vessel were found lying two sacks of wheat. The wreck is supposed to be a schooner named "The Success," of Auckland, of about fifty tons, some upper works of a small vessel and two life-buoys with "Success, Auckland," marked on the latter, having been found at the mouth of the Waimakariri river, and she is believed to have been wrecked during the heavy gale on the 5th instant. The jury returned a verdict of—"Found drowned." Description of the bodies—A white man, about 24 years of age, about 6 or 6ft. lin. high, well made, about 13 or 13½ stone in weight, brown curly hair, very slight moustache, no other hair on face, tattoo mark on right fore arm of an eagle with a woman riding it with American flag in her hand, in blue and red, "Young America" underneath; the only clothing on was a pair of grey woollen drawers, one grey worsted sock, and one unbleached cotton one, a pair of good dark striped tweed trowsers, a pair of oilskin trowsers, a pair of sailors' sea boots (like Wellingtons), and a belt round waist, no marks on any of them. The second man, apparently a Kanaka, or Maori, judged about thirty years of age, but all flesh having been eaten away from the face, this estimate cannot be of much value, about 5ft. 9 or 10in. high, stout build, black hair, good teeth, tattoo mark in blue on each groin and upper part of thigh, also in blue on right arm o w e h n, and band in blue, half way round the right wrist something like, no clothing except part of the waistband of a pair of grey tweed trowsers. The third man, a Kanaka, or Maori, about thirty years of age, 5ft. 9 or 10in. high, well-made, stout build, about 12 stone, tattooed in blue ink similar to the rough sketch, a woman on right fore arm, name on right arm, three schooners on chest, six stars on left shoulder, name on left arm, and a name extending from centre of chest to top of left shoulder, three rings with consecutive circles on left thigh; the only clothing was a portion of a sleeve of a striped cotton shirt on left wrist, a pair of tweed trowsers, a pair of woollen drawers, and a pair of oilskin trowsers, and one blucher boot, one worsted sock, some tobacco in right hand trowsers pocket.
