1. POLICE GAZETTE.—Communications for this GAZETTE should be addressed to the COMMISSIONER OF POLICE, prepaid; they must be of Police interest, or no notice will be taken of them. Officers in charge of stations are requested to report to the Commissioner of Police every instance of the non-delivery of the GAZETTE, and to suggest from time to time such alterations in the addresses and in the mode of transmission as may be considered necessary.

2. WARRANTS.—Whenever it is desired that any individual, whose name is given, shall be apprehended, it should be stated in the advertisement for the GAZETTE whether or not a warrant has been issued for the apprehension of the Offender. When a warrant has not been issued in the first instance, any subsequent report announcing the issue of a warrant should refer to it in the POLICE GAZETTE.

3. NAMES.—It is particularly requested that in all Informations the names of persons and places may be spelt correctly, and written legibly, the Christian name being given with the Surname, and written in full, to prevent mistakes.

4. STRAY CATTLE.—No advertisement of lost horses or cattle will be published in this GAZETTE, unless they be Government property, but notices of horses or cattle believed to be stolen will be inserted gratuitously.

5. PROPERTY DESCRIBED.—The brands of horses and cattle should be imitated as nearly as possible, and their exact position given.

In describing watches, it should be stated whether they are open-faced, hunting, double-cased, or half-hunting,—the term "double-cased" being reserved for those watches whose outer case is removed in order to wind; "half-hunting" implying a very small glass in the middle of the dial.

6. REWARDS.—No rewards must be accepted by the Members of the Force without the sanction of the Commissioner of Police. When such claims are made, a full report of the circumstances must accompany the application. They will not be allowed except in cases where meritorious actions showing unusual ability take place, or when they have been sanctioned by Legislative enactment.

7. PREVIOUS REFERENCES.—It is requested that in all reports respecting cases already gazetted, Officers in charge of Police, or others concerned, will be good enough to quote the date and page of the POLICE GAZETTE in which the previous notice has appeared, and, in reporting arrests, to state by whom effected. Supplementary reports of cases already reported, but not gazetted, should contain such information as will clearly identify the case.

8. TELEGRAMS.—In telegrams, the use of figures must be avoided, and words at full length substituted. In forwarding the brands of horses and cattle per telegraph, it should be stated of what kind of letters the brands consist, whether of Roman capitals or in writing, &c.

NOTICES.

REWARDS FOR THE DISCOVERY OF
ILLICIT DISTILLATION.

It is hereby notified that rewards varying in amount from FIVE POUNDS to FIFTY POUNDS will be given for such information as may lead to the detection and conviction of persons engaged in ILLICIT DISTILLATION. The rewards will vary in amount in proportion to the importance of the seizure, will be payable immediately upon conviction being obtained, and will, in addition to the portion of the fine or of the proceeds of the seizure which by law is to be paid to the person affording the information.

Information may be given to any Collector of Customs or officer of Police throughout the Colony.

The name of the person giving the information will not be divulged except with his own consent.

WHEN warrants are issued for the arrest of offenders who may be in other Colonies, they should be signed by Magistrates whose signatures can be identified by some person resident therein. Certified copies of the original charge and information must accompany each warrant, which must be forwarded to the Commissioner's Office.

THE Members of the Force in command of Districts will forward to this office an accurate description of any of the criminal class changing their haunts in this Province, or leaving for any other settlement or Colonies, that information may be forwarded to the proper authorities.

THE attention of Members of the Force is especially directed to Clauses 27, 28, and 34 of "The Protection of Animals Act, 1867," as the efforts of the Canterbury Acclimatization Society are frustrated by the wanton destruction of birds and animals which is continually taking place.

MEMBERS of the Force in charge of out-stations should use special diligence in enforcing the provisions of "The Dog Nuisance Ordinance."

PETER CONDEL or **CONDEN** is charged on warrant with disobeying a summons to appear at the Resident Magistrate's Court, Rangiora, on the 16th July. Description:—Irish, miner, 30 or 32 years, 5ft. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. to 5ft. 8in. in height, light hair; whiskers, beard, and moustache, sandy, worn full and long; medium head, round features, blue or grey eyes, nose rather hooked, stout square build, about 13 stone weight, erect and active gait. Dress when last seen: old light grey sac coat rather short, old Bedford cord trousers strapped with moleskin, watertight boots, light brown Yankee hat; looks as if he drank. This man is identical with the Peter Conden or Connor charged on warrant, together with one "Ben," with obtaining goods by false pretences on the 10th July, 1872, from Thomas Thompson, of Rangiora. Description of "Ben":—A Prussian, navy, 25 years, 5ft. 7in., stout build, about 12 stone weight, fair complexion, blue eyes, fair hair, slight whiskers, beard and moustache, straight nose, erect gait, dressed in tweed; carries a gun, has worked on the South line, followed by a black and tan cattle dog, carries large swag, which would probably contain two pairs Bedford cord trousers large rib, one pair Aberdeen socks red rim on toe, two pairs grey merino socks, dark tweed vest, and Inverness coat, two white silk pocket-handkerchiefs, one with red spots; all the above articles are new. These men are supposed to be making for the West Coast, Reefton, or Wellington. "Ben" tries to adopt an Irish accent. Peter Condel was followed by a brown retriever bitch, with registered collar No. 1572 (1872), and a black and tan cattle pup, no tail, four months' old.

MURDER—£100 REWARD.

WHEREAS, on the 1st instant, Sergeant Andrew Sutherland, of the Coura Police, was shot dead at Binnie Creek, and whereas the following is the result of a magisterial inquiry held on the 3rd instant, before C. Campbell, Esq., J.P.:—"That Andrew Sutherland, late Sergeant of Police at Coura, whilst in the discharge of his duty was shot dead by some person or persons unknown on the 1st instant, at Binnie Creek, about five miles from Coura." Notice is hereby given that a reward of one hundred pounds will be paid by Government for such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the guilty person or persons.

A WARRANT has been issued by the Dunedin Bench for the arrest of Richard C. Evatt, charged with embezzling in the months of May and June, 1872, at Dunedin, £200, the moneys of Messrs. Offender is an Englishman, a clerk, 22 years of age, 5ft. 9in. or 10in., brown hair worn very short, small dark whiskers and moustache, stout compact build, sallow complexion, under jaw protruding, which gives him a peculiar appearance. He left Port Chalmers on the 10th June, by the steamer *Albion*, supposed for Melbourne, accompanied by a young man named Anderson, who has been in the employ of the same firm as a woolwasher.
