

1. POLICE GAZETTE.—Communications for this GAZETTE should be addressed to the COMMISSIONER OF POLICE, prepaid; they must be of Police interest, or no notice will be taken of them. Officers in charge of stations are requested to report to the Commissioner of Police every instance of the non-delivery of the GAZETTE, and to suggest from time to time such alterations in the addresses and in the mode of transmission as may be considered necessary.

2. WARRANTS.—Whenever it is desired that any individual, whose name is given, shall be apprehended, it should be stated in the advertisement for the GAZETTE whether or not a warrant has been issued for the apprehension of the Offender. When a warrant has not been issued in the first instance, any subsequent report announcing the issue of a warrant should refer to it in the POLICE GAZETTE.

3. NAMES.—It is particularly requested that in all Informations the names of persons and places may be spelt correctly, and written legibly, the Christian name being given with the Surname, and written in full, to prevent mistakes.

4. STRAY CATTLE.—No advertisement of lost horses or cattle will be published in this GAZETTE, unless they be Government property, but notices of horses or cattle believed to be stolen will be inserted gratuitously.

5. PROPERTY DESCRIBED.—The brands of horses and cattle should be imitated as nearly as possible, and their exact position given.

In describing watches, it should be stated whether they are open-faced, hunting, double-cased, or half-hunting,—the term “double-cased” being reserved for those watches whose outer case is removed in order to wind; “half-hunting” implying a very small glass in the middle of the dial.

6. REWARDS.—No rewards must be accepted by the Members of the Force without the sanction of the Commissioner of Police. When such claims are made, a full report of the circumstances must accompany the application. They will not be allowed except in cases where meritorious actions showing unusual ability take place, or when they have been sanctioned by Legislative enactment.

7. PREVIOUS REFERENCES.—It is requested that in all reports respecting cases already gazetted, Officers in charge of Police, or others concerned, will be good enough to quote the date and page of the POLICE GAZETTE in which the previous notice has appeared, and, in reporting arrests, to state by whom effected. Supplementary reports of cases already reported, but not gazetted, should contain such information as will clearly identify the case.

8. TELEGRAMS.—In telegrams, the use of figures must be avoided, and words at full length substituted. In forwarding the brands of horses and cattle per telegraph, it should be stated of what kind of letters the brands consist, whether of Roman capitals or in writing, &c.

Stolen.

STOLEN from the dwelling of Mr. Robert Parkes, Gloucester street west, about the 13th or 14th August, a pair of Colonial gold earrings, leaf pattern; one of them has been mended—identifiable.

STOLEN from the till in Mr. Thomas' shop, Whately Road, on the 4th September, about 50 shillings, principally in half-crowns and shillings; one shilling much worn and burnt, which is identifiable. Margaret Guerin is suspected.

STOLEN from Thomas Edwards, at the Temperance Boarding-house, Tuam Street, on the night of the 6th September, one £5 note and four half-crowns— not identifiable. Three other men slept in the same room.

STOLEN from the premises of Richard James Pearce, Cambridge terrace, on the night of the 24th August, two habit-shirts, one worked in imitation of Brussels lace, the other worked in muslin; and two odd sleeves— identifiable.

STOLEN from the Government gardens, between 12 noon 17th, and 11 a.m. 20th August, a merino sheep, 8 years old, with long tail, has never been shorn; lame, walked on its knees—identifiable.

STOLEN from the till of Mr. John Cole, Dublin street, Lyttelton, about 2 p.m. 10th September, thirteen shillings, principally in crowns and two-shilling pieces— not identifiable.

STOLEN from the barque *Glenshee*, a field-glass and case, maker's name J. Eadie, Edinburgh; the rim of one of the eye-glasses had a small mark or dent upon it; value £3— identifiable.

STOLEN from the person of Alfred Vernon, a passenger per s.s. *Maori*, from Lyttelton to Timaru, on the 19th September, a brown leather pocket-book, 6in. by 3in., fastened with an elastic band, containing one £10 note, No. 1212, Bank of New Zealand; four £5 notes, Nos. 45, 43, 72, 81, bank unknown; three £1 notes, bank and numbers unknown; a bill for £250 on C. W. Turner, Christchurch, payable on the 7th October, 1872; all but three £1 notes identifiable. A man named John Arnold is suspected. Description:—Irish, labourer, 33 years, 5ft. 5in., stout build, about 12 stone, fresh complexion, fair hair, beard, whiskers and moustache, large head, round features, cut scar on forehead, dressed in a black billycock hat, dark tweed suit, laceup boots. Arnold was proceeding to Timaru to work for Mr. Vernon, who was under the influence of drink on the passage, and missed his pocket-book after leaving Akaroa.

STOLEN from the Presbyterian Manse, Hampden, Oamaru, on the night of the 18th September, the property of the Rev. James Beard, one very large open-faced gold lever watch, No. 10587, elaborately carved flowers on the back, gold dial, black figures, gold guard attached, small link pattern, much worn, maker's name not known. It has been cleaned and repaired by Mr. Hislop, watch-maker, Princes street, Dunedin, about eight months ago, who no doubt can give the maker's name. It was left to be repaired by the Rev. Mr. Riley; value of watch £20, chain £3 10s.—identifiable.

STOLEN from the till in the booking-office of the Lyttelton Railway Station, between the hours of 1.30 p.m. and 2 p.m., on the 25th September, the sum of four pounds five shillings and twopence, consisting of two notes, gold and silver—not identifiable.

STOLEN from the person of John Callaghan, on the South Town Belt, Christchurch, between the hours of 9 p.m. and 12 p.m., on the 15th September, an old silver verge hunting watch, maker Frenche, No. 12,458, and a gold albert guard attached, scaley pattern—identifiable.

JAMES GILLAM is charged on warrant with misdemeanour under the Bankruptcy Act (failing to attend final examination), at District Court, Oamaru. Description:—English or Colonial, about 30 years, 5ft. 8in., medium build, upright gait, fresh complexion, bushy dark-brown straight hair, whiskers and moustache, hazel or black eyes; a bullock driver and bushman.

WILLIAM MIDDLETON is charged on warrant with embezzlement. Description:—A native, 13 years, 4ft. 10in., stout build, full face, fresh complexion, large head, fair hair, high forehead, dressed in grey-striped cloth coat, part of sleeve of different material, cord trousers, cloth cap, watertight boots; has been employed as a milkboy; supposed to be looking for work on some farm or station.

FRANK DOHERTY is charged on warrant with disobeying a summons to appear before the Resident Magistrate Court, Oxford, on the 25th September, 1872. Missing Friends.

INFORMATION is urgently desired as to the whereabouts of Robert Manisty, aged 26, 5ft. 8in. or 9in., stout build, fair complexion, fair hair, short sandy beard, whiskers and moustache, full face, weak eyes; is well educated, and very fond of drink; was last heard of in April, 1871, when he wrote from Greymouth, giving the address: W. Russell, Nelson Creek, Grey Valley.

REVERTING to Criminal Offences, dated Christchurch, September 12, 1871, the chain described as having been lost from the old wharf, Ferry road, has been found near the place where the ketch *Elizabeth* was anchored, and has been returned to the owner.

REVERTING to Criminal Offences, dated Lyttelton, 9th February, 1871, the glazier's diamond therein referred to has been found by Mr. Cummins, in a box into which it must have fallen out of his coat-pocket.

REVERTING to form of inquiry for missing friend George Duckmanton, he is ascertained to have sailed for Melbourne.

WANTED to know the whereabouts, if alive, of William John Dowsley, who came out in 1863, from the town of Clonmel, Ireland, with the late Mr. Crosbie Ward, then the Postmaster-General of New Zealand; was last heard of in Christchurch in October, 1864, when he spoke of joining the Auckland militia; was in delicate health at that time. His friends wish any information whether he be alive or dead, in the form of an affidavit before some official or magistrate, that it may be used by his family, as property is depending on it.

WANTED an owner for a cheque for £5, drawn by Brown, in favour of Heron, and dated 14th September, 1872, which was picked up last month by Mr. Ball, publican, Woodend, and forwarded to the Police. Also, for the sum of ten shillings, in silver, which was found by Mr. Hall, railway porter at Kaiapoi, in a railway carriage, about a month ago.

Travelling expenses.

Witnesses residing at a distance exceeding one mile from the place of trial, expenses not exceeding 1s. 6d. per mile one way.

If there is a steamer or coach or other public conveyance, either the whole or part of the way, the actual cost of such conveyance in lieu of mileage. Where they travel by water, fore-cabin fare will be allowed to the first and second class of witnesses, and chief-cabin fare to the latter classes.

Witnesses in the pay of the General or Provincial Governments will not be paid for their time, but only for extra costs occasioned by their attendance.
