The gentleman, whose portrait heads this article, is a well-known member of the A.M.P. Society and is the local manager of the Wanganui branch of that institution. Apart from his qualities as a business man, he is keenly interested in sport, and it is in this capacity that he appears in our columns. Mr. Pownall made his first appearance on the running track in 1890, and since then he has competed in 35 finals, winning 12, being second 10 times, and 3 times third, which is not at all a bad record. His principal wins were: The Wellington Caledonian Society Amateur Handicap, the Friendly Society Bracelet, the Napier Wanderers Bicycle Club's Bracelet, and the President's Cup, at the Wellington Football Club's annual sports. As a member of the Wellington Star Boating Club he won several Club races, including the Junior Fours, Junior Sculls, Senior Fours (twice) and Senior Pairs. In Wanganui he appropriated the Junior Fours and at Nelson rowed second in the Champion race won by Canterbury. He has been a member of the Wellington Football Club for 3 years and last year represented Wanganui. Mr. Pownall is popular in both business and sporting circles. He is still a young man, being only a shade over 26 years of age.
