- (g) Physiology: Prof. Strong, Home Science Department. 24 hours.
- (h) Mental Hygiene: Dunedin Hospital, Tutor. 12 hours.
- (i) Sanitation and Hygiene: Hospital Tutor. 24 hours.

Field Work.—Students selecting this option will be required to do practice teaching under supervision, and will be afforded opportunity of studying hospital and training-school administration.

Post-graduate Training: The Committee suggests that the course for post-graduate training of registered nurses commence as soon as the nurse-tutors are available. They suggest that two certificates be offered—one in Teaching and Administration in Schools of Nursing, and the other in Public Health Nursing. To gain either of these certificates, the nurse must spend twelve months studying the

subjects as laid down for the fifth year of the Diploma. The fee for either of these Post-Graduate Courses to be 25 guineas.

It may be mentioned further that Hospital Boards are being approached with the suggestion that they should especially at the beginning of the scheme be responsible for the cost of this training for specially-selected nurses, on condition that they agree to return to the Boards' hospitals as sister-tutors to undertake the training of probationers for a specified period.

At the same time a suggestion is being made with regard to the institution of preliminary training-schools, but that is too lengthy a matter to be entered upon here. By the time of our next Conference, however, I have every hope that there will be some definite result of the Department's efforts in this direction.

MISS MOORE'S APPOINTMENT.

Miss Janet Moore, A.R.R.C., trained at Dunedin Hospital and Batchelor Maternity Hospital, and until recently Matron of Waikato Hospital, Hamilton, has been sent to England by the Government to undergo the ten months' course for Nurse Administrators and Teachers. This course was instituted by the College of Nursing, Bedford College, London University, and the League of Red Cross Societies at Bedford College, London.

On her return Miss Moore will be appointed Instructor at Otago University in connection with the Diploma in Nursing. Connected with this diploma, a post-graduate course will be arranged for the instruction of nurses, already registered, in the duties of Sister-Tutors. It is hoped that many nurses will take advantage of this course, returning to the hospitals throughout the Dominion to take up the work of training probationers both in theoretical and practical work. Further details of the scheme are given in another column.
