## SILVER WEDDINGS.

#### ME AND MRS ROWIN MITCHRISON.

HE Hon. Edwin and Mrs Mitchelson, of 'Waitaramos,' Remuera, were 'At Home' to their numerous friends at a garden party on Saturday afternoon, the occasion being the celebration of their silver wedding.
