Nutritious men lie buried. The Avenida da Liberdade is a fine promenade bordered with trees, but the every-day business life of the city may be best studied in the Juna Garrett and in the squares near the Tagus.

IN THE JURA MOUNTAINS.

The Jura Mountains are rather neglected by tourists. They certainly cannot be compared to the Alps in majesty and grandeur, but are as a terrace or natural platform from which the latter may be viewed to the best advantage. One's parting vision of the mountains of Berne and Fribourg obtained from the Jura behind Neuchatel leaves an ineffaceable impression on the memory. But this border range, shutting off the Switzers from their quondam foes, the Burgundians, has itself a picturesqueness of its own. It blends the beauties of the Alps and the Ardennes. Mountains soaring to above 5000 feet, hills sombrely draped in forests of firs, appalling chasms and romantic gorges, smiling valleys, brawling streams, and pretty villages make up a scene not to be despised even by an explorer of the Alps. The district contains many fine points of view and pleasant, unpretending health resorts, where those who have spent more money than they had intended to at Interlaken, or Zermatt, might economize without curtailing their holiday. Neuchatel itself is a dull town—yellow and tame was the description applied to it by a French traveller—but Chaumont and Ste. Croix are delightful resorts in all senses of the word. Vallorbes, a customs station, is also a good place for a stay, and is convenient for the lac de Joux and a romantic, interesting country. In this region is the Val de Travers, a name which immediately conjures up memories of sweltering London asphalt and of pungent bituminous odours, but which is that of a very pleasant and salubrious valley. Before leaving this part of Switzerland, Grandson, on the Lake of Neuchatel, should be visited, for a sight of its high peak-roofed Burgundian castle beneath the walls of which Charles the Bold was defeated, as readers of "Anne of Geierstein" will remember.

RAUPO SCHOOL DISTRICT.
All that area in the Auckland Land District commencing at a point on the Waikato River, being the termination of the south western boundary of the Parish of Toka Toka, bounded towards the North generally by the south western and southern boundaries of the Parish of Toka Toka to the waters of the Parish of Omareu, and towards the East generally by part of the western boundary of the Parish of Omareu to the Awaroa Stream, and by that stream and the Waikato Creek to the Waikato River; and towards the south and south west generally by the Waikato River thence to the point of commencement.
