The pretty church of St. Mary's, New Plymouth, was the scene of an exceedingly dainty wedding on Wednesday, August 22, when Miss Alice Teed, youngest daughter of Mr David Teed, senior, was married to Mr Everard R. C. Gilmour. The Rev. F. G. Evans conducted the marriage service. The bride, who was given away by her father, was charmingly attired in a creation of cream chiffon taffetas, the bodice being richly fronted with fluted bells of silk and lace, and trimmed with tiny loops of gossamer silk ribbon, short puff sleeves finished with pleated chiffon and lace, while the skirt was appliqued with raised French knots. A beautiful silk embroidered family veil, over a crown of orange blossoms completed this charming toilette.
