which has been organised as a diocesan movement rather than a parochial one, to raise funds for a new organ for the St. Mary's Pro-Cathedral, Parnell, was opened last Monday in the Royal Albert Hall, Mrs. Neligan, introduced by Canon MacMurray, performing the open-ing cermony. The hall looks charming, with its well furnished stalls, all artistic-ally decorated with beautifully made artificial spring flowers, with masses of lycopodium, tree ferns, and nikau palms as a background. The gallery has been arranged as a smart, up-to-date tearoom, where one can see everything and room, where one can see everything and at the same time partake of a delicious cup of tea, with the usual accompanicup of tea, with the usual accompani-ments of cakes, bread and butter, fruit salads, otc., and in the gallery also the band is stationed, which plays both in the afternoons and evenings. Downstairs all the stalls are arranged round the all.
