Mr. Sydenham, in giving a description of every knuwn sweet pea in commerce says: "I know there may be a few others that have been exhibited during the last year or two as new varieties under fancy names, but these must be looked upon wirh great caution. There may also be some other new varieties that have only been exhibited during the past year (1909) in different parts of the

country, but as they were neither sent to Reading for trial, nor exhibited in any of the larger shows. I can hat-fly be blamed if they are not described." Mr. Sydenham gives the following, what he considers the best, forty-six varieties in cultivation or that will be in commerce during the present year:—
