This bronze statue of "Industry" has been presented to the Institute of Marine Engineers of New Zealand, for erection in the entrance hall of their fine new building in Atken-street, Wellington, by Mr F. Reddaway, principal of the firm of F. Reddaway and Co., Ltd. The statue stands 3ft 6in high, and bears the inscription, "To My Brother Helms Across the Seas." It will be unveiled and formally presented to the Institute by the Minister for Railways, acting on behalf of Mr Reddaway.
