## GALA NIGHT AT THE OPERA-COVENT GARDEN DECORATED FOR A COMMAND PERFORMANCE.

The Royal Covent Garden Opera House is the home of Grand Opera in London. It is controlled by an influential syndicate, formed in 1896, the personnel of which is made up principally of leading members of the aristocracy. The conductor's seat, seen in the top photo, has been occupied by many famous mustchans, amongst whom may be named Richter, Stramss, Campanial and Nikisch. It is usual in all big coremonies of State to have a Royal command performance, and the Opera House is descrited for the occasions with thousands of flowers and electric lights, as shown. The Royal box is seen in the Grand Tier (second row of boxes), with the librariated crown above it. Above the three tiers of loves is the amphitheatre orbairs, and beyond that main in the distance is the gallery—the remickions of all truly mustical enthusiasts. Above the amphitheatre on either side, just under the celling, in the lower photo, are "the slips" (behind the railings), where there is standing room only.
