The deceased lady passed away on the 30th ult, after a long and painful illness. Universal sympathy is felt for Mr. Fell. It is also our end duty to chronicle the death, on Saturday last, of Mrs. Little, wile of Mr. Cornelius Little, of Auckland. Her end, though peaceful, was tragic. It will be remembered that one afternoon, less than a fortnight ago, Mrs. Little, with her sister, Mrs. Nucl-son, paid a visit to some friends at Milford Beach. They afterwards went for a stroll. Within a short time both hadies were struck down by some mya-terious illness, which proved to be cere-bral hemorthage. Mrs. Nicolson suc-cumbed within a few hours, while Mrs. Little legrend for more than a week. She was too ill to be moved, and only regained consciousness temporarily and at long intervals.
