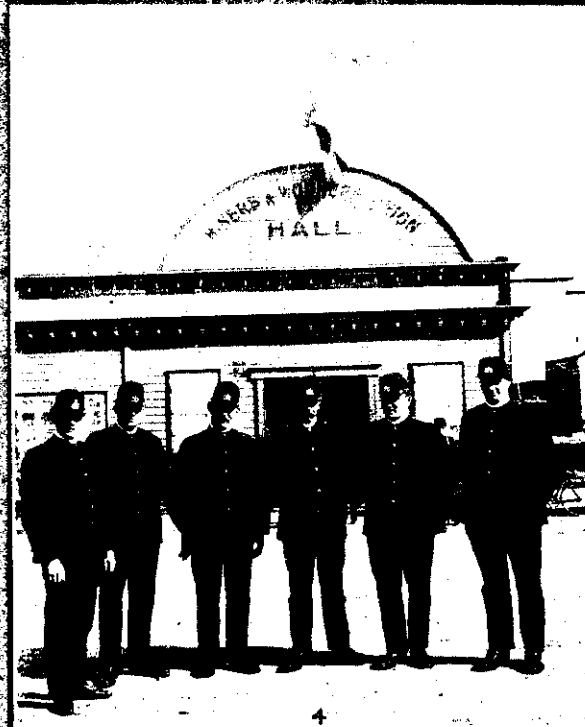

WHERE THE FATAL CONFLICT BETWEEN THE WAIHI STRIKERS AND ARBITRATIONISTS TOOK PLACE.

(1) Some of the leading spirits of the Arbitrationists' Union. Third from the left, in the front row, is the president, Mr. Kidd. On the extreme left of the photo is the door through which the arbitrationists forced their way into the hall. The first shots were fired through this door, a worker named Johnston being shot in the leg. (2) The redoubtable "Cocky," in the centre, and two of his pals. "Cocky" is credited with having had more individual fights than any other man in Waikato. (3) A number of workers outside the newly-captured Miners' Union Hall. (4) A police patrol. In the background is the Miners' Union Hall, showing the Union Jack and Red Ensign, which the workers hoisted in place of the red flag of the Federationists. (5) The mounted police, under Sergeant Miller, who have done splendid service during the strike. (6) Outside the hall, Commissioner Cullen with his back to the camera, talking to the organiser of the workers' union, Mr. Walsh. (7) Crowd watching a timely picket being advised to leave the town.
