One of the most prominent strike-breakers.

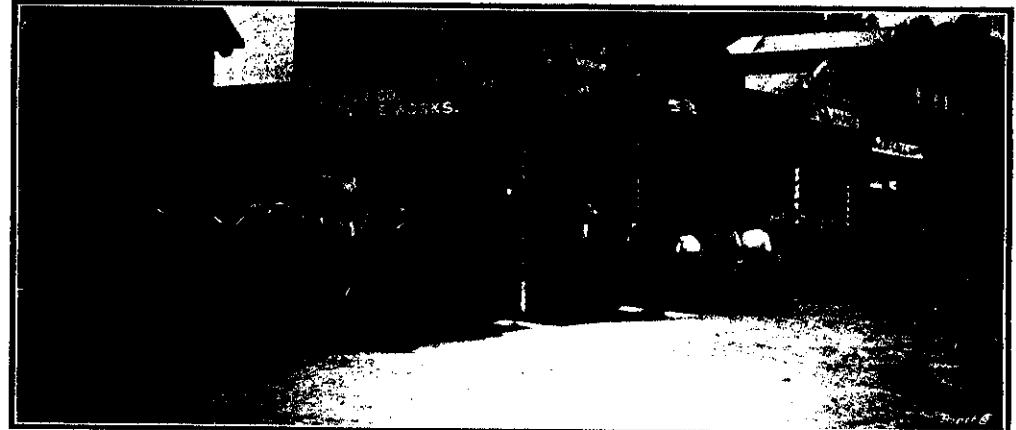


THE LATE F. G. EVANS,
Who is alleged to have shot Constable Wade. Evans was felled by the constable's baton and received fatal injuries.

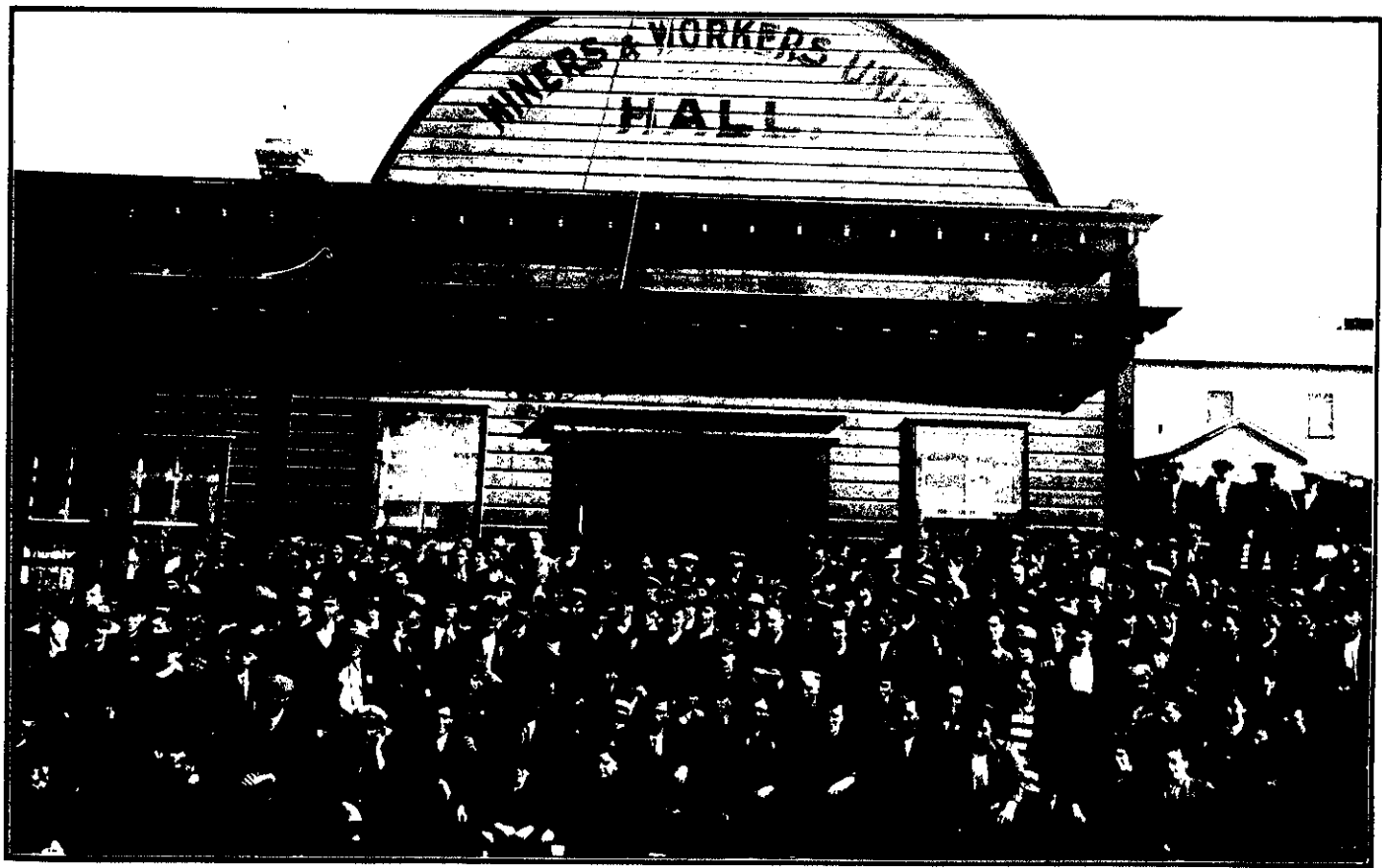
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REV. P. CLEARY,

THE NEW MASTERS OF THE SITUATION IN WAIKIKI.—THE MEN WHO TURNED THE TABLES.

The above photo, taken outside the Miners' Union-Hall at Waikiki shortly after its capture on November 12th, shows the arbitrationists who stormed the place and completely routed the federationists. The hall had been the headquarters of the strikers ever since the commencement of hostilities, and it was here that Constable Wade was shot and the striker Evans received fatal injuries.
