THE ROYAL STAKES

Of 500 sovs., the owner of the second horse to receive 20 per cent., and the owner of the third horse 10 per cent. out of the stake. For two and three-year-olds. Weight for age. Winners after August 1st, 1895, of any race or races collectively of the value of 250 sovs, 8lb.; of 500 sovs, 5lb.; of 750 sovs, 7lb.; of 1000 sovs, 10lb. Maiden three-year-olds at time of starting, allowed 10lb.; two-year-olds, 7lb. Six furlongs.

By subscription of 10 sovs each, payable to the Secretary of the A.R.C. on General Entry Day, Summer Meeting, 1895, unless forfeits are declared and paid as follows:—

Yearlings (foals of 1892) may be struck out upon payment of 2 sovs by the second Friday in January, 1895; or upon payment of 4 sovs by the first Friday in September, 1895; or upon payment of 6 sovs by the first Friday in December, 1895.

Foals of 1893 may be struck out upon payment of 2 sovs by the second Friday in January, 1895; or upon payment of 4 sovs by the first Friday in September, 1895; or upon payment of 6 sovs by the first Friday in December, 1895.

Should there not be twenty-five horses left in on first Friday in September, 1895, the committee reserve the right to reduce the stake.

All horses remaining in after the first Friday in December, 1895, must pay their total entrance of 10 sovs by 12 noon the day before the race.

Should there be any surplus arising from the subscriptions it will be given to the race.

Entries close on FRIDAY, July 20, 1894, by 9 p.m.

Football.

The attendance at Potter's on Saturday to witness the settlement of the various contests was not so large as on previous Saturdays. A considerable number nevertheless found their way to Epsom, and were well repaid for their journey by the interesting nature of the two senior matches. The weather kept fine during the progress of the games, and the few showers which fell after the conclusion of the contests in no way inconvenienced the visitors.

At the usual Thursday night meeting of the Rugby Union, it was resolved that the matches played on Saturday last should be the last contests in the senior division for some considerable time. This is due to the fact that several interprovincial matches are likely to take place very soon, and the Union is desirous of allowing our probable representative players to have several practice matches. The annual match between Auckland and the Thames will in all probability take place on the 14th July, whilst word has been received from the New Plymouth Union that they wish to have the annual interprovincial fixture between Auckland and Taranaki set down for the last week of the same month.

Owing to the numerous visiting teams with which our province will have to compete this season it appears at present extremely doubtful whether time will permit of the Union conducting a second round for the district senior championships. The fixtures on Saturday last were the final heats of the first round, and for the third time in succession the Parnell district comes out of the ordeal with all the honour and glory. If the championship be decided by the matches which have already been played this district will be hailed the winner of the much coveted honor for the season 1894 with the fine performance of six matches played, five won, nil lost, one drawn, eighty-one points scored for, and eight points scored against. There can be little or no doubt that the majority of those who patronise the game would have liked this season to see the senior championship carried off by the representatives of some other district, but there are, nevertheless, more who grudge the winning district its success. It must be manifest to all that the success of the Parnell team is not due to any superiority on the part of its individual members, but rather to the interest and enthusiasm which they display, not only on the field but also in their practices and training. The team at present possesses splendid combination, which has not, however, been acquired without great perseverance, and its present premier position on the list is a fitting and natural consequence to its untiring efforts.

The Newton—Ponsonby game which took place in front of the stand attracted the attention of nearly all present at Potter's. From start to finish the game proved an interesting contest, notwithstanding that the points, 14 to nil in favour of the Newtonites, indicate otherwise.
