THE ROYAL STAKES

Of 500 sovs., the owner of the second horse to receive 20 per cent., and the owner of the third horse 10 per cent. out of the stake. For two and three-year-olds. Weight for age. Winners after August 1st, 1895, of any race or races collectively of the value of 250 sovs., 8lb.; of 500 sovs., 5lb.; of 750 sovs., 7lb.; of 1000 sovs., 10lb. Maiden three-year-olds at time of starting, allowed 10lb.; two-year-olds, 7lb. Six furlongs.

By subscription of 10 sovs each, payable to the Secretary of the A.R.C. on General Entry Day, Summer Meeting, 1895, unless forfeits are declared and paid as follows:—

Yearlings (foals of 1892) may be struck out upon payment of 2 sovs by the second Friday in January, 1895; or upon payment of 4 sovs by the first Friday in September, 1895; or upon payment of 8 sovs by the first Friday in December, 1895.

Foals of 1893 may be struck out upon payment of 2 sovs by the second Friday in January, 1895; or upon payment of 4 sovs by the first Friday in September, 1895; or upon payment of 8 sovs by the first Friday in December, 1895.

Should there not be twenty-five horses left in on first Friday in September, 1895, the committee reserve the right to reduce the stake.

All horses remaining in after the first Friday in December, 1895, must pay their total entrance of 10 sovs by 12 noon the day before the race.

Should there be any surplus arising from the subscriptions it will be given to the race.

Entries close on FRIDAY, July 20, 1894, by 9 p.m.

Football.

NOTWITHSTANDING that Saturday last turned out a beautiful day for football the attendance at Potter's to witness the second (and last) practice match between the possible and probable candidates for rep. honours was very small. The competing teams competed:—

A team—Fullback, Kissling, quarters, Roberts, McPhail, halves, McDonald, Bullock, Braund, forwards, Anderson, Heffernan, Mills, Murray, Rhodes, Stone, C. Speight and Valentine.

B team—Fullback, Masefield; three quarters, McGill, Flynn, Rishworth; halves, Edmonds, Roynard; forwards, Brady, Donald, Gittos, Hallamore, M. Hobson, Moore, H. Speight, Williams and Wright.

The absentees were Peace, Elliot and Oliphant from the A team, and Warnock from the B team.

McPhail, Bullock, Murray and Flynn filled the positions of those absent.

Immediately after the kick off the backs of either team indulged in interesting exchange of long kicks, which the A team had slightly the better of the ball going into touch in their opponents' 25. From the throw in Stone, Murray and Rhodes were prominent in dangerous rush, which was well stopped by Masefield, who kicked well up the field. Roberts returned, and a scrum was formed in the B's 25. The latter were too powerful for the A forwards, but Braund cleverly secured the ball and made a quick pass to Bullock, who transferred to Breen, the latter enabling McPhail to get in at the corner by a well judged pass. Stone took the kick, but the ball fell short. Uninteresting play followed the kick off, until a fine dribble by Hellamore carried the leather to midfield, where Edmonds picking up smartly passed out to Flynn, who made a strong run to the opposing fullback, and then sent the ball on to Rishworth, who drew first blood for the B team by getting in near the corner flag. No goal resulted. A 3, B 3. Stone kicked out, and Flynn returned with a splendid punt, the ball going out near the A's goal line. Loose play followed the throw in, and the ball went out at the 25 flag. From the throw in the B forwards got on a capital rush, which ended in Hallamore securing B's second try. Edmonds converted—B 8, A 3. Stone again kicked out, and fast following up by Rhodes prevented a return. The B forwards replied with a determined rush, which was well stopped by Braund, who made a short quick pass to Bullock, the latter lost a splendid chance through passing wildly, and Masefield kicked well down the field. From a scrum formed in the centre of the ground Braund again obtained possession of the oval, and after making a smart dodgy run passed out
