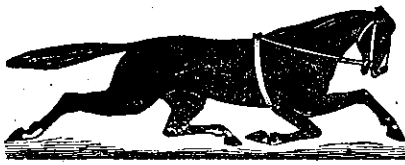
Eros is a beautiful bright bay, with black points, standing 16.1 high, and full of quality, and the possessor of a splendid temper. He is the only son left in New Zealand of that wonderful mare Idalia, who produced Betrayer, Liverpool, Fair Nell, and Sir Modred and Cheviot, who are now the champion sires of America.

Idalia, the dam of Eros, as a brood mare, is well worthy to take rank with the famous old-time mares Penelope, dam of Whalebone and Whisker, or of the Alexander Mare, dam of Selim Reubens and Castrel, or of the more recent but equally celebrated Pocahontas, dam of Stockwell, Rataplan, and King Tom; for, like these celebrated English matrons, Idalia's sons have already become known far and wide by their phenomenal success as stud horses in America, where Sir Modred and Cheviot are now located.

Yattendon, the sire of St George, who sired Eros, was also sire of Grand Flaneur, a horse that never suffered defeat, and winner of all the great three-year-old events, beside Champion and Melbourne Cup. Amongst numerous other of Yattendon's stock mention need only be made of Lady Emma and Yatterina, whose performances in New Zealand are too well known to mention.

Cambuscan, sire of Idalia, was also sire of the celebrated Hungarian Mare Kinsem, who won 54 races, and never suffered defeat.

THE STANDARD-BRED STALLION

DESCRIPTION: LARUE, foaled in 1889, is a bright bay with black points, 16 hands high, both hind feet white, and small star on forehead. He is grand looking and resembles the Electioneer, being a grandson of that noted sire. His trotting action is first-class.

PEDIGREE: Sired by Campaign, 9811, son of Electioneer, 125, sire of 145 trotters in the 2.30 list, including Arion, 2.07 1/2 (Arion 2.10 1/2, champion 2-year-old record), Sunol, 2.08 1/2, Palo Alto, 2.08 1/2.

First dam Clara D., record 2.49 (when with foal), is sister to Honesty, 2.25 1/2, and Mockingbird, 2-year-old record, 2.38. Clara D. is also dam to Dewdrop (by Elect) that trotted a mile over the Sacramento track in 2.25 while owned by P. C. Hale, of Hale and Co.; Priam, 1793, the sire of Clara D. is the sire of Frank M., 2.17, Honesty, 2.25 1/2, Harry M., 2.24 1/2, etc.

Second dam Western Girl, by Chieftain, 721, sire of Deiance, trotting 2.24, pacing 2.17 1/2; Caro, 2.26, and sire of the dams of Mt. Vernon, 2.15 1/2; Crown Prince, 2.17 1/2; Tempest, 2.19; Chief Phoenix, 2.20, etc. Western Girl is full sister to Western Boy, 2.35 1/2, and the Lyle mare that could trot with mate in 2.30.

The thoroughbred horse THE WORKMAN (By Robinson Crusoe—The Maid).

Major F. N. George's well-known bay horse will serve a limited number of mares at Wapiti, Epsom, this season. The breeding of The Workman should gain him a high place in breeders' favour, and whether the quality of his forerunners was transmitted to him may be gauged by the performances standing to his credit. As is well known, it was only through a mishap that he was prevented from adding to his list the last Auckland Cup (won by his stable companion Pegasus).

The Workman's victories include the following:—A.R.C. Welcome Stakes, 5 furlongs, 8.5, in 1m 5 4-5s; V.R.C. Farewell Handicap, one mile, 8.1, in 1m 41s (beating The Harbour Light, Fortunatus, etc.); C.J.C. Handicap, 1 mile, with 8.5, in 1m 41s, beating Aldershot, Thame, etc.; C.J.C. Electric Plate, w.i.a., 4 furlongs, with 9.1, in 49 3/4, beating Roseguard, Rebellion, and others; A.R.C. Newmarket Handicap, 6 furlongs, 9st, in 1m 18 1/2, beating St. Clements, Lottie, etc.; A.R.C. Victoria Handicap, 7 furlongs, 9.5, in 1m 35s; He also ran second to Loyalty in the First C.J.C. Challenge Stakes, 6 furlongs, carrying 9.0, the winner cutting out the distance in 1m 14s. STALLIONS FOR THE SEASON 1894.

The undermentioned THOROUGH-BRED STALLIONS Will stand at Wellington Park:—

CASTOR (imp.) by Zealot (son of the famous sire Hermit, winner of the Derby, 1867) out of Lady Yardley, by the great Sterling (sire of Isomomy—said to be the greatest racehorse of his day). Castor was a great performer at all weights and distances, winning 22 races out of 28 starts. Of the five descendants of Castor that have raced, not one has finished unplaced. Castor's first gets have all shown ability on the Turf. His three-year-old son, Three Star, has the following record for his two-year-old running:—A.R.C. Summer: won Great Northern Foul Stakes, 6 furlongs, 8.10, in 1.19 1/2; Nixie, 8.5 second, Doris 8.5 third; second in Midsummer Handicap, 5 furlongs, 9.0, won by Nixie 8.7. A.R.C. Autumn: won Northern Champagne Stakes, 6 furlongs, 9.3, Grenadier, 9.10 second, Anniversary, 8.8 third. The Castor—Veneration filly Ivy won the Wanganui J.C.'s Nursery Handicap, 5 furlongs, with 6.10 in 1.4, and at the Auckland Racing Club's Autumn Meeting she won the Onslow Stakes, 6 furlongs, with 7.4 in 1.19. His colt out of Bangle, Casket, finished second in the Marshall Memorial Stakes of 6 furlongs at the D.J.C. Autumn Meeting, won by Forbury, and also ran a second with 8.10 in the Champagne Stakes, won by Bluefire 8.8. His Necklace filly, Collarette, ran second to Patroness at level weights in the A.J.C. Two-year-old Maiden Stakes, and on the third day of the meeting she beat Patroness and similar company to that which met her on the first day, winning the 6 furlong Nursery Handicap in 1min 16 1/2secs.

CUIRASSIER.—by Musket (imp.)—Frailty, by Goldsbrough—Flora McVior, by New Warrior (imp.)—Io, by Sir Hercules. Cuirassier is full brother to that successful sire Trenton, who in his first season in Australia has sired Ronda (second in Melbourne Cup), Delaware, Etra—Weenie (winner of the Maribyrnong Plate and V.R.C. Oaks), Gaillardia, Lady Trenton, Light Artillery (one of the best two-year-olds of the past season)—all good winners. Cuirassier himself ran second to Manton in the Hawkes Bay Guineas (beaten a head), and won the Great Northern Derby (beating Manton, Raglan, Hilda, etc., in the fast time of 2min 40 1/2sec), the Great Northern St Leger, Railway Stakes Handicap, and Trial Stakes. Terms:—25 guineas for single mare; 20 guineas two or more the property of the same owner. His yearlings are very promising.

ST. LEGER (imp.), by Doncaster (Derby winner) out of Atlantis, by Thormanby (Derby winner)—Hurricane (One Thousand winner), by Wild Dayrell (Derby winner). St Leger was second on the list as a winner-producing sire for 1891-92, and was at the top of the tree for the season of 1892-93, with 14 winners of £5,250 7s 6d. He was second for last season. He is sire of St Hippo, winner of the Hawkes Bay Guineas and Spring Handicap, New Zealand Cup in fastest time on record, Auckland Cup, Auckland Plate, and Great Northern Derby; and sire of other big winners, such as Clanramald, Hippomenes, St Andrew, St Clements, Impulse, St Anthony, Marquis of Tewkesbury, Town Moor, St Kilda, St Patrick, Ben Godfrey. HOTCHKISS, by Musket (imp.)—Petroleuse (imp.), by Oxford—Hartshorn, by Mountain Deer. Hotchkiss's half-sister Leonessa is dam of Westmore, who was well up in the list of winning two-year-olds. Hotchkiss will be limited to 10 mares besides his owners. Terms: 20 guineas a mare.

Blairgowrie's performances are as under:—As a two-year-old at Sydney Turf Club: Won Sapling Stakes, 3/4 mile 8.0, time 51 1/2. V.R.C. Meeting: third to Acme and Madeline, Maribyrnong Plate, 5 furlongs, 1.4 1/2; won Flying Stakes, beating Madeline and Acme, 3/4 mile; third in December Stakes, 5 furlongs, 9.1, time 1.3; second in Ascot Vale Stakes, 3/4 mile, 9.6, time 1.18. A.J.C.: Won Champagne Stakes, 6 furlongs, 8.10, time 1.15; second First Foul Stakes, 9.0, Volcano first, 8.2, 6 furlongs, 1.14. At three years: Second in A.J.C. Derby, won by Trident, 2.38, fastest ever been run; second to Trident in the Champion Race, V.R.C., 3 miles; and second to Abner in Doncaster Handicap, A.J.C.

It will therefore be seen that his performances are first rate at all distances and under big weights, and being a change of blood in this colony, and coming from a good racing family (Vespasian being a first-class performer in England under big weights) ought to be everything that is desired to beget racehorses.

At the Bourke Meeting in May three of his get were first, second, and third in the Mares' Produce Stakes. He is also the sire of Caroline, the winner of the Sires' Produce on the second day.

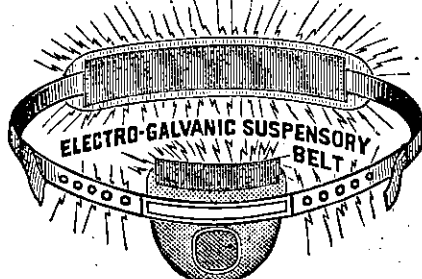
