The "two Cups" have been laid on the shelf for another year, and in both cases the majority of backers have been, as is generally the way, "not in it." That is, however, hardly a correct remark, for in the matter of Impulse, we up at this end of the Island have been fairly abreast of the result; but as regards Patron, our calculations have been sadly upset. And a similar remark may be applied to our Coastal and Southera brethren in the case of the New Zealand Cup. No Northern horse is allowed a chance in the big Riccarton handicap, as witness the prices at which Rosefeldt and St. Hippo were sent out of the saddling paddock, and now the son of St. Leger and Aida comes along as a further uppercut to Southern prejudice, and game little Lottie right worthily follows suit in the matter of crushing the self-esteem of the Southern cracks. Onehunga is in the seven'h heaven of delight, the province generally pats itself on the back, and the ripples of the local enthusiasm is reflected the face of the Wellington Park Studmaster, who can justifiably feel proud of the continued success of St. Leger's fine son. Castor did not score; but St. Leger did so the account is equal. Scarcity of space this week will only allow a glimpse at the events at Riccarton and Flemington, and starting at the latter arena we find times generally slower for the opening day than was the case last year. Havoe worthily sustained his breeding in the Maiden Plate, going out at 2 to 1 and winning easily in 1m 48s for the mile, with The Enchan-ter second and Perturbation third. Nine stone was the burden carried by Frailty's son, who has at last scored for Wellington Park. Ruenalf gave 3ib in the Melbourne Stukes to his relation, Patron, and easily beat him in 2m 101s for the mile and a quarter, Mr. Purches' horse just beating Bruin by a neck for second place. "Randwick Plate, three miles, has cruelled him," murmured the experts, and when later in the week Grand Flaneur's son moved indifferently in his gallops, up went the cry, "No chance in the Melbourne Cup !" And when one recollected that Ruenalf, who had beaten Patron, giving him 3bs. over the 14 mile, would take 24lb. from him in the 2 mile race, it certainly looked any odds on Ruenalf again proving the better of the pair. But racing is a wonderful game, as the Cup showed. After Foxtail had won the Hotham Handicap in 2min. 534sec. for the mile and a half and a distance, the Derby candidates came out and New Zealand's hopes went down, for Bonnie Scotland did not justifyour hopeg, although it seems a fair thing to say that his rider rode anything but a good race. The winter favourite, Dreamland, was also badly ridden; but those on the spot state that the best colt (The Harrester) won, his time being 2min. 401 sec., and his nearest attendant being Malachite, after whom came Bonnie Scotland. The customary big crowd assembled on Cup day, and the going was satisfactory, although the times were not so good as those recorded last After Figaro ad easily won the Hurdles carrying 10.3 over the old three miles in $6.1\frac{1}{2}$, the six furlong race, the Railway Handicap of 200 sovs, saw llium—a 10 to 1 chance—win by a length in 1.184, the New Zealand-bred Philson being second with an advantage of 71bs. Last year Titan scampered over this distance in 1.16. The Lochiel—Constance colt, Killiecrankie, cantered over his opponents in the five furlong Kensington Stakes in 1.62, and then came the Cup. Once again the unexpected came down in a heart-shaking fashion. Patron the "awfully cruelled" relic of Chesterman's A.J.C. Randwick Plate, went out at 33 to 1 and won handsomely. A great race, says the cableman, and I say a great surprise, but there is little use in: being surprised at anything taking place in a Melbourne Cup. We have seen outsiders and cripples win that annual puzzle until the ability to be surprised should be non est. The gallant four-year-old son of Grand Flaneur The gallant four-year-old son of Grand Haneur appears to have been in the bunch until half-way up the straight, and then he came like a hero and beat the lighly weighted Devon by three-quarters of a length, ada, Mr. Wilson's selected, being only a neck be-hind the second. Ruenelf on his recent victory over Patron with 9.3 up was sent out at 5 to 1 (2 to I was his measure locally), but he was never in it, like most Melbourne Cup favourites. The time was 3m 31s. Down at Riccarton good weather and a fine attendance was experienced, and that the sovereigns were loose in the spectators purses is evidenced by the fact that £14,925 was landled in the machine, us against the £12,353 operated on last year. The starting machine was used with success, and the Cup was won by umpulse to the delight of the North and the Impulse, to the delight of the North and the polite disgust of the South. We always thought our mortgage on the Cup was a strong one, but that our stables would supply both the winner and runner-up was certainly not expected. The First Hurdle Race, 2 miles, saw Kulnine step out a 4½min. (according to wire) gait under 12.5, easily beating Nenthorn (9.0), Kapua (11.5), and half-a-dozen others. The Newminster -Forest Queen three-year-old, New Forest, covered the Maiden Plate mile in 1min. 43½ sec., Goodwood (8.2) and Casket (7.7) being the other placed ones. Dividends, £6 15s. and £8 6s. Then the "thousand pounder" came on the green, and the kernel of the race appears to be this. The Auckland pair, Impulse and Lottie, kept behind the crowd until the home Lottle, kept behind the crowd until the home bend was rounded, and then flashing out, the pair rapidly overhauled the leading con-tingent, the members of which succumbed one by one. At the distance the son of St. Leger and Aida had everything beaten, and despite a flash by Lottie he got home by three-quarters of a length from Mr. Kean's mare Aldershot, the outsider of the race being a similar Aldershot, the outsider of the race being a similar distance away from the Muskapeer mare. Rosefeldt and Saracen were the favourites"on the machine. Au Revoir was close up to them and Lottie was next; but Impulse, with only Auckland and a little coast money behind him, was able to return $\pounds 18$ 19s. and $\pounds 18$ 8s. 6d. to his admirers. 
