Failing that, New Zealanders would very much like to see Aurum and Gold Medallist measuring strides. In the meantime both Mr Stead and Mr Wilson must be regarded as pillars of the Turf, and are entitled to the hearty congratulations of true sportsmen for having produced such colts as Gold Medallist and Aurum.
