of professionals; the advisability of renewing the Australasian agreement, which expires by the effluxion of time at the completion of the next Australasian Championship meeting, a Wellington confrere says:---"In connection with the above I might mention that there seems no valid reason why an Australasian Athletic Union should not be organised. There is something of the Federal spirit about the idea; it would be productive of a great deal of good, and the interests of the sport would be better conserved. With regard to the reinstatement pro-posal there would no doubt be some friction and New Zealand would probably come in for some hard knocks at the proposed conference, if such were held. It is a well-known fact that amateur authorities on the other side do not approve of the apparently wholesale manner-so they describe it-in which professional runners are "whitewashed' and allowed into the fold in this sinful country. And perhaps they are right. However, I don't know that the N.Z.A.A.A. have done very much that they ought not to have done. It must be remembered that this is a small colony comparatively speaking, and that it is only during the last few years that there has been a pronounced addition to the list of amateur clubs on the Association's The consequence has been that roll. runners who had raced for money applied to be reinstated, advancing the argument that there were no amateur clubs in their districts when they started running, and they had perforce to race as pros. In a number of instances of this sort reinstatements have been granted. In other cases where clubs had existed and pros. desired to come in they had to "stand down" for a considerable period before being admitted as amateurs. There were, of course, instances where "desirable" pros — from a running standpoint-were reinstated, but there have also been a great many applications refused. However, it is to be hoped that the conference advocated by Mr. Coombes will be held, and that New



Fry also made things "hum" when making his 68, for in that total there were 13 fours. 
