

champion miler of Australia. A new pneumatic tyre has been put on the English market by I. W. Boothroyd, whose name has been associated with the tyre business for years. Briefly put, his idea is to use the inner tube merely as a means to seal the joint between the two ends of the cover. This done, the cover is inflated and used as a single tube tyre. If a puncture occurs, all the rider requires is to inflate the tube by a second valve, and ride home on a double tube tyre. The weak point of the idea is the seal formed by the collapsed or partially inflated tube filling up the space; but the English experts who have examined the idea say that this is perfect.
