NOTES.

Those two great stallions, Brown Hal and Baron Wilkes, are the only two horses that have sired two 2:05 pacers. Brown Hal leads with Star Pointer, 1:59‡, and Hal Dillard, 2.04³/₄. Bumps, 2:04¹/₄, and Rubinstein, 2:05, go to the credit of Wilkes.

A new use has been found for steel by a firm in Sheffield, England, who are now making a steel harness trace, consisting of a narrow ribbon of steel, from \$ to 1 inch wide, rolled very thin and cased in leather. A single trace of this kind when tested at the Sheffield testing works, recorded a tensile breaking strain of 4,575 pounds, corded a tensile breaking strain of 4,575 pounds, while an ordinary leather trace of the best quality, tested at the same time, broke at a strain of 2,700 pounds. In addition to being lighter and stronger than the ordinary trace, the steel article is about 20 per cent. cheaper. The steel is so pliable that it can be twisted in any direc-tion tion.

Clara D. is also dam to Dewdrop (by Elect), that trotted a mile over the Sacramento track in 2.28, while owned by P C. Hale, of Hale and Co.; Pram 1798, the size of Clara D., is the sire of Frank M., 2.17; Homesty, 2.253; Harry M., 2.243, etc. Second Dam Western Girl, by Chiefton 721, sire of De-fance, trotting 2.34, pacing 2.174; Caro, 2.26, and sire of the dams of Mt. Veraor. 2.15, Crown Prince 2.174, Tempest 219, Chief Thorn 2.20, etc. Western Girl is full sister to Western Boy 2.384 and the Lyle mare that could trot with mate in 2.30. Third dam, the J.H. Dodge mare, dam of Western Boy 2 383, by Jim Crow (Coburn's), said to be thoroughbred.

Francisco, says: In the last stall is a horse whose make-up and pedigree will attract general attention in the land he is going to. He is called La Rue and his registered number is 20,141. 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

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
