MacFarlane), but Armstrong now alleges that the ticket held by the club is not the one given to the secretary by him. After consideration the stewards were of the opinion that the case was more for the decision of a criminal court than under racing law, which practically means that the club should take proceedings against Armstrong. Balbirnie was the first to show in front, but very quickly Rosiphele assumed the lead, with the rest very handy. Rosiphele died away as the straight was reached, and Zealous and Lady Avon came on just in front of the others. At the terraces Zealous was challenged by Matamata-arakiki, and a desperate finish between the pair saw Scahore's sister win by a long head from the long named one, with Lady Avon close up third. Zealous is a nicely made filly, rather small yet, but she gallops with any
