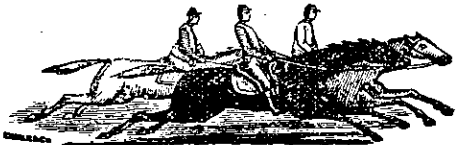

THE THOROUGHBRED AND WELL-KNOWN SIRE "RADAMES," [By Leolinus]

Will stand between Thames, Paeroa and Te Aroha this season.

Leolinus by Caterer [by Stockwell], out of Tasmania; Tasmania by Melbourne [sire of West Australia and Blink Bonny]. Radames dam L'Orient [imp.] by Knight of the Crescent out of Egyptian by Touchstone out of Area, by Gladiator out of Twilight, by Velocipede out of Miss Garforth, by Walton.

RADAMES has been a good performer; he won the R.C. Handicap and Maiden Plate at Waipawa, the Turanga Stakes at Poverty Bay, dead heat with Administrator for Easter Handicap of 2 miles [3min. 35sec.] at the Auckland Autumn Meeting, and the Papakura Cup.

RAGLAN was sired by Cap-a-pie, whose cross-country stock are favourably known. Tenambra, the dam of Raglan, was a highly-bred mare, and ran five seconds in Auckland after being imported from Australia. She was sired by that grand horse The Marquis, and two of the races he won were the classic English Two Thousand Guineas and the St. Leger. When on the turf Raglan proved himself a thorough honest horse and first-class stayer, able to last to the end of a Cup race, carrying weight and defeating the best horses in Auckland. In sprint races he showed his pace by beating performers like Teksum (who won races against the best horses in Australia), Cissy, and others.

As will be seen, Raglan is a suitable horse to breed from to get racehorses and fast cross-country stock; and if put to rooky active mares, to get weight-carrying hacks and active harness horses.

Shillelagh, who won the Hurdle Race at the A.R.C. Winter Meeting, 1888, Hurdles at Wellington, Ladies' Bracelet at Christchurch, and won the Great Northern Steeplechase, 1892, was also sired by Hippocampus; as were also Theorem, winner of the Wellington Hurdle Race, and The Baron, the best three-quarter-mile in Auckland, and others too numerous to mention.

The Thoroughbred Horse "ST. PATRICK."

St. Patrick, who was foaled in 1877, is by The Premier out of Phoenix, by Gownsmann out of Ikamataki, by Figaro out of Brunette, by Riddlesworth. The Premier is by Malton (imported son of Riteman) out of Revoke, the dam of Trump Card and Amazon. Gownsmann (imp.) was by Surplice (winner of the English Derby) out of Tomyris, by Sesostris out of Glaucus mare.

Phoenix, the dam of St. Patrick, won the Pahatunui Stakes at Wellington and the Consolation at Masterton in 1875, beating large fields in both races. She also ran second to Cocksure in the Hutt Park Stakes, third for the Provincial Plate, and third for the Consolation, the pair in front of her in the latter being Fishhook and Pungawerewere (both Dunedin Cup winners). Phoenix was a good performer over all distances, competing successfully against the best horses of her day.

St. Patrick has been shown six times and taken six first prizes as a sire for getting carriage horses.
