The Premier is Malton (imported son of Rifleman) out of Revoke, the dam of Trump Card and Amazon. Gowmsman (imp.) was by Surplice (winner of the English Derby) out of Tomyris, by Sesostris out of Glaucus mare.

Phoenix, the dam of St. Patrick, won the Pahutanu Stakes at Wellington and the Consolation at Masterton in 1875, beating large fields in both races. She also ran second to Cocksure in the Hutt Park Stakes, third for Provincial Plate, and third for the Consolation, the latter in front of her in the latter being Fishhook and Hwerewere (both Dunedin Cup winners). Phoenix was a good performer over all distances, competing successfully against the best horses of her day.

St. Patrick has been shown six times and taken prizes as a sire for getting carriage horses.
