When on the turf Raglan proved himself a thorough honest horse and one of the stayer, able to last to the end of a long day, carrying weight and defeating the best horses in Auckland. In sprint races he showed his pace by beating performers like Teksum (who won races against the best horses in Australia), Cisy, and others. As will be seen, Raglan is a suitable horse to breed from to get racehorses and fast cross-country stock; and if put to rooemy active mares, to get weight-carrying hacks and active harness horses. TO STAND THIS SEASON AT MORRINSVILLE THE THOROUGHbred Horse "ST. PATRICK,"

St. Patrick, who was foaled in 1877, is by The Premier out of Phoenix, by Gownman out of Ikamataki, by Figaro out of Brunette, by Riddlesworth. The Premier is by Malton (imported son of Rifenman) out of Revoke, the dam of Trump Card and Amazon. Gownman (imp.) was by Surplice (winner of the English Derby) out of Tomyris, by Sesostris out of Glaucus mare. Phoenix, the dam of St. Patrick, won the annual Stakes at Wellington and the Consolation Stakes in 1875, beating large fields in both races. She was second to Cocksure in the Hutt Park Stakes, Provincial Plate, and third for the Consolation Stakes in front of her in the latter being Fishhook and Fung werewere (both Dunedin Cup winners). Phoenix was good performer over all distances, competing successfully against the best horses of her day.
