not as well forward as he might be, he is not by any means on the sick list. Therefore I should advise backers not to entirely disregard him. Strowan, 7.11, is entitled to the greatest of respect, and so will Skirmisher, 7.9, be if he come to the post, but I do not look on that as a very probable contingency. I think we may eliminate the C.J.C. Welcome Stakes winner from the list. The chances of Westmere and Strowan will be better estimated after their Champagne battle, but I think Mr Paul's colt will hold his own with the best of them. Unless it be Zanella, 7.2, or Lake Shell, 6.13, I don't see that any of the light-weighted twoyear-olds can beat Strowan and Westmere, and both these youngsters will have had a previous opportunity of getting their strength guaged through Strowan and Westmere in the Champagne. The Workman; the best of Mr Stead's trio, which I take to be Strowan ; Westmere and Lake Shell seem to me the quartette most likely to fight it out, and with the uncertainty as to what penalties may be incurred over the first day's racing, I think it wisest to indicate my opinion that whatever beats THE WORK-MAN will win.

DUNEDIN JOCKEY CLUB'S MAY MEETING.

THE Dunedin Jockey Club received excellent entries on Friday last for the two principal items of their May Meeting, which is set down for Wednesday, May 24 (Queen's Birthday), and Saturday, May 27. There are 26 entered for the Birthday Handicap of 300sovs, one mile and a half, and 30 for the Provincial Handicap of 250sovs, one mile and a quarter. Mr Paul has engaged Bou-langer and Cretonne, and I also notice The Dancer in the list. These are the North Island contingent, but several of the best South Islanders are there, including Stepniak, Prime Warden, Tempest, Hippomenes, Lustre, Whakawatea, Heather Bell, Kulnine, Merrie England,

Saracen and Vogengang. The weights for the Birthday Handi-cap are due on May 2.

SOUTH AUCKLAND RACING CLUB.

THE weights for the South Auckland Racing Club's Autumn Meeting on

7.10, seems to me well in, and though the distance is perhaps slightly outside Marguerite's compass she may get a decent mile and a half with 7.0, but I take the top weight to beat the lot if he accept.

After the Novel Race (entries for which close on Saturday) the Cambridge Stakes Handicap of 20sovs, one mile, will engage attention. TURANGANUI NATIVE JOCKEY CLUB.

THE Gisborne sporting folk will, on Easter Monday, be able to enjoy them selves at the meeting of the Turanganui Jockey Club, on the Poverty Bay Park Co.'s course. The lists of acceptances appearing in another column show that excellent acceptances have been received for four of the handicaps of the programme, there being five out of six left in the Hurdles, seven out of ten in the Tairawhite Handicap, eight out of twelve in the Maori Race, and eleven out of thirteen in the Easter Handicap.

AUCKLAND RACING CLUB'S AUTUMN.

THE weather at the time of writing is so beautifully fine that it seems as if the clerk of the weather-who is always an all-important factor in the calculation of Racing Clubs-were going to hold off his watering pot during Saturday and Monday next, when the Auckland Racing Club bring off their Autumn Meeting. Let us hope his good temper will not have changed on Saturday morning.

The response to Mr Evett's adjustments for the Easter and Steeplechase Handicaps, which owners made on Tuesday night, was very gratifying; the Champagne acceptance of 8 was more than was expected; and with the exception of the Selling Handicap the nominations for the minor events, though not totalling as high as last year, were never theless satisfactory.

It is rather awkward that the exigencies of publishing necessitate my writing these lines before I see the weights for the Tradesmen's Plate, Hurdle Handicap, Eden Handicap, Onslow Stakes Handi-cap, and Selling Handicap, which were due last night, and which will appear on another page of this issue.

The Tradesmen's Plate, which is a handicap run over a mile and a distance, opens the ball, and then comes the

of 200sovs, added to a sweepstake of 10sovs each, 5sovs forfeit, 6 furlongs. The eight acceptors include winners in Pegasus, Royal Rose, Eve, Noyade and Captivity; but the only one of these that has incurred a penalty is Pegasus, who has to put up 7lb extra owing to his winning the Auckland Welcome Stakes last November. With the five winners mentioned above and the maidens-Stanmoor, Mahaki and Cobweb-the contest is bound to be a good betting one. fancy Pegasus' penalty will stop him, and of all the colts I should take Royal Rose o be the dest. Little Eve has certainly had a hard season's campaign of it, but she will appear at the scratch pink enough on Saturday, and she has shown herself such a good one this season that she looks a certainty for a place, if not to win outright. The Napier representative Noyade has shown herself slippery, and if only she, Eve, and Royal Rose were in the race there would still be the materials for plenty of interest. But when to these are added the comparatively untried ones the puzzle is the greater. However, I don't think I shall be far wrong in predicting the victory of Eve, with Noyade second and Royal Rose third. The big handicap of the day is next on the card in the shape of the

Before commiting myself to a tip, I may as well men-tion in justice to Mr Evett that there were only seven absentees from his handicap, and of these Morion is dead; Brigand is at home at Gisborne; Dishonor has only just been taken up; Pani and Loch Ness were racing in Napier the other day in bad form; Durus is at Wanganui; and Lady Belle's present form did not warrant her owners in paying up for her. As between Impulse, Captain Russell's pair Tulloch and Ida, it should be a splendid race, but my vote goes for Tul-LOCH.

For the other four events of the day, viz., the Hurdles, Selling Handicap, Eden Handicap, and Onslow Stakes Handicap, the weights are not to hand at the time of writing, so I pass on to the

In the endeavour to make a place selection I shall select Yum Yum, Fishmonger and Neli to finish in that order.

The Tradesmen's Plate entries number the Hurdles 12, the Selling Handicap 5, Eden Handicap 16, Onslow Handicap 9, Stewards' Handicap 12. Ellerslie Handicap 12, Shorts Handicap 18, Welter Handicap 12, and Flying Handicap 20.
