Henri-Mayer has a first-class reputation in Europe, and is looked upon as being equal to Major Taylor, Lawson, Kramer, and Ellegaard, and has many brilliant wins to his credit. Of Larsen and Nodela we have little knowledge, save that they are riders of the first class, and it may be fairly argued that unless they had some pretensions to speed above the ordinary they would scarcely have been inclined to come so far abroad.

It would now appear that instead of there being a paucity of oversea riders here this season, there is every indica-tion of an overplus, for with Samuelson, Lawson, and Macfarland there will be no less than eight foreign racers of note. But what we want is two or three local riders who can make a good showing against them, for this would produce interest, and the public who patronise the sports meetings would be more concerned in even a nearly equal struggle between our own men and the visitors than between the visitors themselves. Unfortunately, the methods adopted here do not tend to develop the best qualities of our riders, or even inculcate a desire to reach the top of the tree. It is not the best rider or riders who may win the richest prizes, but those who are favoured by a combination of a liberal handicap, good luck, and a certain amount of extraneous aid.

The final scores for the championship of America, decided by points in eleven events of from a quarter to five miles in length, show (according to a contemporary) that Frank Kramer heads the list with 59 points, with Ivor Lawson 38 points, second. Fenn is third with 26, J. Bedell fourth with 18, and Macfarland J. Bedell fourth with 18, and Macrariand fifth with 11.
