

**BOWLING.**

There were five rinks in play at Rocky Nook on Saturday, the keenest fight being between Small and Taylor, former just getting home with a single point in his favour.

Seventy-two bowlers mustered at at the Ponsonby green on Saturday. The green is in capital order for the season.

Auckland Grammar School beat St. John's College by 258 for 8 wickets (innings closed) to 76.

The annual meeting of the Thames Cricket Association was held last week. Last year's honorary officers were re-elected. Mr. W. H. Renshaw was re-elected secretary and treasurer, and Mr. W. A vote of thanks was passed to Mr. Crease, for his donation of a handsome cup for the season's club competitions.
