THE OLYMPIC GAMES.

THE RECENT CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Writing of the recent Australasian championships, "Prodigal," of the "Referee," says that the victory of the New Zealanders was pronounced and fully deserved. The New Zealand team, without question, won on their merits. Theirs was a welltrained, well-organised, and well-equipped team, and the combination was undoubtedly well handled by Mr. J. E. Green. I have heard excuses made for New South Wales, perhaps the most amusing, and at the same time absurd, being that the late selection of our distance runners had something to do with our defeat. would have made no difference whatever had they been chosen six months ago. Since 1896 we have not succeeded in winning the 880 yards, and have never yet won either the mile or the three miles. Since the days of Darymple and Corner we have not succeeded in unearthing a distance runner in the same class as the crack Victorians and New Zealanders. Force of circumstances and tack of tunds necessitated a late arrival in Hobartand unquestionably this late arrival affected the chances of Colin Stewart and H. A. Scott, whilst enforced want of practice probably caused the downfall of O'Reilly with the hammer. Otherwise, it can safely be said that none of our defeated men in the distance races and walks could have won in any circumstances or under any conditions. They did their level best, but were not quite good enough.

ABUSE IS NOT ARGUMENT.

The fact that Wellington men won four out of the seven championships carried off by New Zealanders at the recent Australasian championship games at Hobart does not please "Sprinter" of the "Canterbury Times." Dr. Newman, who drew attention to the fact, is described as bombastic and showing a spirit parochialism "as narrow-minded as it is deplorable." "Amateur," of the "Witness," who referred to the good work of the Wellingtonians, is summed up as either ignorant or careless. or both, and a writer of "piffling non-sense." Did "Sprinter" help to select the team, or is he blowing steam on behalf of someone else?

THE INTER-VARSITIES' TOURNA-MENT.

The New Zealand University athletic tournament, to be held at Dunedin at Easter, is the seventh annual Canterbury College tournament. have been three times premiers, and Otago the same number, beating Victoria College, Wellington, last year by a narrow margin. The list of championship events is a large one, comprising:—100 Yards, 220 Yards, Quarter-mile, Half-mile, One Mile, Three Mile, Mile Walk, 120 Yards Hurdles, 440 Yards Hurdles, Long Jump, High Jump, Weight and Hammer Throw-ing. Each centre is allowed two representatives in each, first man counting 2 points and second 1 point. The winning college holds the Challenge Shield for the ensuing year.

The other special trophies are as follows:-Ladies' Cup, for competitor scoring most points; Trevor Hull Memorial Shield, for the High Jump; cup presented by Mr. de la Mare for the Mile Flat; Sandstein Cup, for the Inter-college Relay Race. This cup Inter-college Relay Race. has been held three times by Canterbury, twice by Otago, and once by Wellington.

A MODERN ATALANTA.

Madame Isa Bell, who recently issued a challenge to race any woman in Australia any stipulated distance for the gate money and a side stake, up to a reasonable sum, has received replies from female athletes, who are prepared to dispute the woman championship of Australia. Three of these reside in various parts of the State, and the other two are city bred. A match is being arranged between Madame Bell and Miss Violet Leigh, the woman champion of South Australia, to take place in Melbourne some time next month. Madame Bell is 36 years of age, and has a daughter aged 14. Her running costume consists of loose trunks reaching below the knee, loose jacket, running shoes, and stockings.

When one finds thirty-two men running ten miles under an hour in one club race, there can be no fear of England's decadence at long-distance running. That was the performance accomplished on the Belle Vue track, Manchester, on Saturday, January 18th, in the Salford Harriers' ten miles championship. The first four men were covered by 49 seconds. W. H. Whittingslow repeated his victory of 1907. His time was 56 min 10sec.

Mr. R. Coombes has been re-elected president of the Amateur Athletic Union of Australasia, and Mr. S. E. Marks hon. secretary, while Mr. Stan. Rowley was chosen as treasurer. Sydney has again been made the headquarters of the union.
