Should the forthcoming meeting be the success anticipated, the club will, in all likelihood, hold another race meeting in the autumn, when the prize-money would be on a very liberal scale.

It is understood that very favourable replies have been received from nearly all the clubs under the jurisdic-Wanganui Metropolitan tion of the Club as to the proposal to appoint stipendiary stewards. The matter is to be further considered at the Metropolitan Club's meeting, and it appears safe to anticipate that a decision will be come to in favour of giving the idea a trial. The experiment would certainly do no harm, and would perhaps tend to improve things very much.

The Rangitikei Club are pushing on with the improvements to their course and appointments, and when the work now in hand is carried to completion the club will be in possession of a splendid track and a grandstand, which will be a credit to all concerned.
