That "Prince of bowling entertainers," Mr Kirker, and his good lady made it the opportunity for entertaining visiting and home bowlers and their lady friends, by a trip round the harbour in the Eagle, and an afternoon on the green watching the play of the contending teams. A large marquee was erected on the lawn, wherein were tables daintily spread with the good things of this life, and most tastefully decorated with flowers and fruit for the visitors, while in the pavilion refreshments for the players could be obtained. In their attention to their guests the host and hostess surpassed themselves, which is saying a great deal. It must have been no slight reward for their hospitality to see the lines of closely packed, delighted spectators eagerly watching the heroic struggle for supremacy of the two colonies, on the best private green in New Zealand. The weather was delightful, and the green as true as it was possible for green to be, and the play was consequently seen to the best advantage. Commencing at 9 o'clock on Saturday week the matches for the handsome clocks presented by Messra Stewart, Dawson and Co. through their, agent, Mr Holden, were not concluded until the following Tuesday morning. Saturday's rounds were played on the Grafton, Ponsonby, and Mr Kirker's greens. There were 38 teams entered for these special prizes, showing the interest taken in them. On Monday evening, after some excellent games, these were thinned down to two, Newmarket and Wellington. Messrs C. G. Laurie, A. H. Brookes, G. H. Laurie, H. W Brookes (skip), composed the one team, and Mesere Reich, Bell, Mentiplay, and Ballinger (skip), the other. That a splendid game was expected was evident by the number of keen lovers of the noble game present. They were certainly not disappointed, for one and all agreed that a more brilliant game had never been played on an Auckland green. At the fifth head Wellington had the substatial lead of eight points, the score standing 10—2. By the eleventh head, however, Newmarket had pulled up and tied their opponent's. Then in the succeeding two heads, Newmarket put in a 3 and a 1. In the fourteenth head, Ballinger, by a splendid drive, cut out the Newmarket shot and scored four for



his side, thus tieing again. Wellington then scored three in two heads and on the seventeenth a cleverly earned three for Newmarket made them level again. The match was becoming more and more exciting every head, and was watched most intently when the twentieth head proclaimed Wellington with three to the good. Newmarket managed to get two in in the last head which Brookes' last ball just failed to turn into three (and tie) by running a few inches two far. Wellington thus winning by one point only. Wellington, therefore, takes the tickers, the Newmarket team, as runners-up, secures the gold medals, while Hoyte, of Mount Eden, and Evans, of Napier, had the honor of being in the semifinals, and do not go absolutely unrewarded.


