The new American schooner Endymion is said to have put up a record in Transatlantic yacht sailing, by covering the distance from Boston to Cowes in 13 rays 20 hours. This vessel's best dsy's run is said to have been 304 miles, her lowest 144 miles, and her daily average 237 miles. One of the most remarkable features of her voyage, however, was that from Sandy Hook till she anchored off Cowes she did not tack ship once.






