

The show goes with a vim that is surprising, not a slow moment being allowed, the orchestra lend-ing splendid aid with lively and well-chosen music. Mr Hawkins, who has conducted for some months, is now to take charge in Dunedin. He has done good wo k here, and was presented with a handsome baton by the Company before his departure. There is such a galaxy of talent now appearing that it is well nigh impossible to particularise, but the Tylers and Leslies certainly seem to hit the reople's taste, as the applause heard in the City Hall of late cannot but satisfy the management. Of the Leslies little need be said, as there are few who have not witnessed the performance of the clever brothers—the Tylers, father and son, can be described in one word, "marvellous." Their feats are done with the perfection of grace and ease, and one feels sorry when their turn is over. The Gonzales contortion work, their movements showing that finish which can only have been attained by Goleman continues in great form, and has been giving some fine exhibitions of step dancing, as it should be, his original "Belinda, Susie, May," giving a fine opportunity for this.

FAMOUS" STUD.

THE dispersal sale of the late Marcus Daly's thoroughbred stud is says the American correspondent of the London "Sports-

man." of importance not only to Americans, but to breeders and racing men the whole world over. To understand the truth of this, it was only necessary to know Marcus Daly and the sort of man he was. He wanted and would have nothing but what he considered gilt-edged, and, as he had all the money necessary to indulge the ambition, he had gradually brought his breeding stud to a point as near perfection as possible. The outlay on his home breeding farm at Bitter Root, Montana, was stupendous, and, when that was completed, he set about the task of securing the best sires and mures obtainable That he should die in the prime of his racing career was s serious loss to the thoroughbred interests of America, and his place will be found hard to fill, seeing that few men, even though they may have the money, have the same willingness to part with it for thoroughbreds. The stallions, eight in number, include not only the best of American blood, but also horses purchased in England for their blue-blooded genealogy. Of the Americans, there is the champion racehorse of his day, Hamburg (1895), by Hanover out of Lady Reel, second dam Minnie Grey, dam of Mr James B. Keen's great racehorse, and Sire Domino (now dead). It may be said of Hamburg that he could win, and did win at any distance from five-eighths to two miles and a quarter. He was purchased by Mr Daly at a figure beyond the means of any but a millionaire, and retired to the stud when in his prime, and sound as a dollar. The benefit of this is evidenced by his success as a sire, his mares-seventeen out of eighteen-all having produced foals, mostly colts, greatly resembling the progenitor. Tammany (1889), by Iroquois out Tullahoma, by Great Topod, hasseen returned already sire of several goods ainors. He was himself a champion among Racchorses, and you have seen one of his get in England, the good racehorse Inishfree. Ogden (1894), by Kilwarlin out of Oriole, by Bend Or, won our Futurity soon after being sent East, and was shorty after. wards retired to the stud. The English impor tations include such successful sires as Inverness

Isidor, and Bathampton, the last-named being without doubt one of the coming sires of America. The brood mares bred to Hamburg include (imp) Ayrshire Rose (1892), by Ayrshire out of Rose of Lancaster, a sister to Bend Or; (imp) Casseopia (1894), a high-class winner, by Friar's Balsam out of Starlight; (imp) Lotitia (1894), by Hilarious out of Festival's dam (dam of a Futurity winner), Chacornac; Ella Gregg, by Salvator; Fleur d'Or, by (imp) Rayon d'Or; Meriden, by (imp) Billet; (imp) Mintcake (1895), by Marcion, out of Mint Sauce (dam of Minting); together with two dozen mares, all of nice age, and bred in the purple. There are fourteen mares covered by Ogden, including such good ones as (imp) Annot Lyle, by Barcaldine, a first-class race mare, also (imp) Rhoda (1885) by Master Kildare, out of Violet Melrose, sister to Melton. Isidor's wives numbered fourteen, and among them is one which at once claims attention, Starlight (1887), a mare by Iroquois and dam of the best horse of his year, The Friar, by Friar's Balsam Kitefoot is another good young stake winner, who is bred to Isidor, also Black Cap (1895), by Royal Hampton. To name all the good ones would mean a practical repetition of the catalogue, so I say nothing of twenty-six extra good matrons who have been mated with the grand young sire Bathampton, and nearly all of whom are evidently in foal.

Beginning with Home Rule, a big bay, by Monarch from an Arab mare, he injured his back in a steeplechase in the Wairaraps, ending his racing career, but he was afterwards ridden by We I can market of the Christian wards ridden by Mr Lyon, master of the Christ-church hounds, and I have often seen Home Bule carrying Mr Lyon across stiff country, and invariably at the head of affairs. Howa, by Puriri-Starwater, and therefore half-brother to Waiwers, etc., was another of Mr Major's. This gelding got staked when being schooled, and had to be shot Waverley, a chestnut gelding by to be shot Waverley, a chestnut gelding by Tekoa broke his neck in a hurdle race at Manaia, Tegos broke his neck in a nurdie rade at Manais, whilst Paraki (by St Leger—Zephyr, and dam of Tommy Atkins) broke her back. Sonats, by Chainshot—Symphony was kicked, and, the bone being badly smashed, she was shot. Bowshot, by Maxim—Rainbow, was running in a paddock at Tongahoe, when he broke his fetlock joint. Mr Worthy, however, attended the horse, and he is now able to get about, walking fairly sound. Chrissie, by Porped .—Christina, was one of the finest mares brought to Taranaki. She was kicked badly on the knee. This ended the hopes of a successful racing career, and she was put to the stud. Ni htingsle, by Forest King—Holloway, and dam of Bowman, was running in the Bell Block Cup when she put her foot in a hote and wrenched her knee, and was r ndered unfit for racing. Docility (Foulshot—Freeson mare) -Treason mare) for racing. broke down in the pink of condition. Crimson Streak by Nordenfeldt—Hipporina, got cast in her b.x the night before the Egmont Meeting in 1898 She injured her fetlock, and was afterwards unfit for racing. Faugh-a-Ball-gh, by Vanguard—Huntsman mare, injured his shoulder when galloping on the Egmont course last May, and has only recently recovered. Tommy Atkins, y Vanguard-Paraki, was one of the emartest horses Mr Major ever owned, yet the gelding was unfartunate. Last Easter he strained his hind fetlock when at Auckland, where he won, and he had to be thrown out of work until August. When the accident happened which ended his career, Tommy was just recovering his form, and mu-t have landed a good stake before the end of the season. How the accident happened, no one knows, but the horse dislocated his knee and also broke his leg in three places, one of the most remarkable accidents that has happened in the annals of New Zealang racing. The number of cases I have quoted of Mr Major's misfortunes are, I fancy, a record, but he is nothing daunted, and is determined to fight fate until the scale of

good fortune turns in his favour.

Waiuku returned to New Zealand on board the Talune, which arrived at Wellington on Thursday last.

Tortulla ran last throughout the race for the Dunedin Cup. Her repeated failures over a mile make one inclined to believe that that distance is beyond her tether.

Handicaps for the races to be run on the first day of the Ohinemuri Jockey Olub's Annual Meeting are due to appear to morrow (Friday). March 8.

During the three days racing at the Dunedin Autumn Meeting, the totalisator receipts amounted to £15,387, an increase of £1456 over the investments of last year's Summer Meeting.

The Hon. W. E. Mitchelson has been appointed honorary judge to the Auckland Racing Club in the place of Colonel Banks, who is on military service in South Africa.

£13,493 was the amount put through the totalisator at the Egmont Summer Meeting. Messrs Hayr's staff managed the heavy business in excellent manner. At the Summer fix ture last year the machine receipts totalled £10,906.

During the recent meeting of the Otahuhu Trotting Club, several jockeys were fined for disobedience at the starting post. For this fault there is only one remedy, the heavy hand of justice. If the riders will not obey the starter, they must be punished by the stewards

Since Mr J. B. Beid purchased Hermosa, the shapely little St Leger—Lady Evelyn mare has well repaid him for his expenditure. Hermosa won the Publican's Handicap on the first day of the Dunedin Meeting, after a slashing race with Brisa, to whom she was conceding 9lbs. I have noted it is the opinion of some papers down South that Brisa was unlucky to lose, but Hermosa is a very game finisher, and I expect the St Leger pluck carried her home.

At the last meeting of the committee of the Newcastle Jockey Club a letter was received from the secretary of the A.J.C., asking that the O'Brien case should be considered. O'Brien is a well known Sydney bookmaker, and at the February meeting of the club he was operating in the paddock, when, it is alleged, he made use of foul language to Mr M. J. Burke, the former owner of Myosotis, who promptly brought the matter under the notice of the stewards. Mr Burke having stated his case, O'Brien was called upon to reply, and both statements having been considered by the stewards, they promptly disqualified the offender for life. The A J.O. asked that the case should be reconsidered, but the stewards, to their credit, be it sid, manfully stuck to their guns, and positively declined to alter their decision. O'Brien will therefore be debarred from betting at Newcastle for the "term of his natural life," says the Sydney "Referee"

There was some good sport witnessed in Hawers, and taken all round, the Club should have had a good time, says "The Grafter" in the Egmont "Post." Nobility, was, of course, the hero of the meeting, and it would have taken a lot of weight to have brought him back to the others. Waiwers showed what a good one he is by winning with 12st on the second day. He was, in my opinion, very lucky to have been awarded the race on the first day. Mamuku was in fine form, and being a clever jumper, her pace stood her once over the last fence. Her run when she best Omprah on the first day was a very fine one, and had the grey mare stayed it out, Mamuku would hardly have reached her. Dartmoor was the best seen out of the back class, and Siandra, I think well just now. pay watching. There is one thing that I think would be a boon to the outside public at Hawers, and that is a notice board similar to what is in-At present one cannot find out the riders until they are out, and then to a lot of people they are unknown. A board similar to that used at Wanganui would fill the want, and I am sure would be appreciated by those outside.

A serious accident occurred at the finish of the contest for the Hack Race on the opening day of the Murrurundi Race Club, says the Sydney "Mail." A dozen horses took part in the race, and when coming down the straight the clouds of dust were so dense that the riders in the back division were unable to see where they were going. Drolga, who was running last at the time, crashed into a fence near the judge's box, one of the rails entered his chest, completely disembowelling him. So great was the impact that the second post was also broken, and the second length of rail—making about 20ft in all—passed through the horse's body before the fence gave way. The horse then fell, and expired in a few moments His rider, S. Ellwell, strange to say, escaped with a severe shaking and a few abrasions, but two persons who were in the vicinity of the mishap - Messes J. Kennedy, of Murrurundi, and J. Bradford, of Quirindi-were injured by the broken timber, the firstnamed receiving a severe cut on the right leg, and the latter a scalp wound, which necessitated his removal to the local hospital.

New Zealanders have had a good innings in Tattersall's sweep on the Newmarket Hardicap Mr S. F. Gore, Sutherland, won the first prize of £4500, Mr F. Ohlin, Christchurch, was the lucky drawer of Fulminate, winning £1800 and Mr P. Hogarth, of Kumara, drew Advance, thereby netting £900.

The opinion prevailed amongst Melbourne Turf scribes, judging from their remarks in last week's papers, that Advance wanted more time to fit him for such a stiff encounter as the Newmarket Handicap. The black colt has been much admired, for his excellent galloping makes everybody like him, but the idea was general that he could not be got ready in time for the big sprint race.

Jupiter's win in the Dunedin Cup was so unexpected that he paid over a ten pound dividend in a field of seven. The St Clair gelding only just got home by half a head from the Hon George McLean's three-year-old colt, Pampero, who starten a very warm favourite. On the second day the colt easily won the D.J.C. Handicap, run over a mile and a quarter. In this race Jupiter broke down through striking himself, and it is feared that he will not be able to race again this season.

Mr Victor Harris is to be condoled with on the accident which resulted in the death of that useful performer, Paladin. The St George— Nellie geldiv g has done yeoman service for the Christchurch sportsman, and without a doubt would have won more races before the close of the present season. Mr Harris has a pretty formidable team now, but Paladin's death removes a strong member of it.

Some of the pony riders at the Otahuhu Meeting were cautioned by the stewards for an absolutely undue use of the spur. It was quite a right proceeding on the part of the Otahuhu stewards, for the severe punishment received by some of the punies was cruei and unnecessar). There are a few level-headed boys riding at Potter's Paddock, but there are others who appear to regard whip and spur as the only means to the winning of a race.

While galloping with Troubabour last Thursday morning at Hawers Full Ory was observed to pull up lame, and up n examination it was found that the Reynard—Vienne gelding was seriously amiss. He has strained the suspensory ligament of the off hind leg, therefore some time must elapse before Full Ory can be raced again. Mr Laurent is to be condoled with, for it is probable that the gelding would have won a race at the Wanganui Meeting.

The adjourned meeting of the stewards of the Chiltern Racing Club was held on Monday, February 18, at the request of Mr R. S. Henry, who stated that he would be present without fail. There was no appearance of Mr Henry. After carefully considering the evidence, it was resolved that R. S. Henry, of Meibourne, be disqualified for life for fraudulent practices in connection with the nomination of Gooramadda, the painted pony that won the Galloway Handicap on January 2.

After the further payment there are ten twoyear-olds left in for the Hawke's Bay Stakes to be run at the Autumn Meeting of the Hawke's Bay Jockey Ciub. Nonette has kept his place, and Mr Stead will be represented by Cruciform Sir George Clifford has paid up for Cannie Chiel and Windwhistle, and the others belong to Hawke's Bay owners. If Nonette should keep as well as he is at present he will make Cruciform and Nobility do their level best to keep with him. During his spell Nonette has grown a lot, alld he is now a very fine and handsome colt.

Menschikoff easily won the Champagne Stakes on the first day of the Dunedin Autumn Meeting. The Stepniak colt carried 9st 10lb, and ran the six furlongs in 1min 20sec. Canteen, the one reckoned to be his best opponent, turned round at the rising of the barrier and took no part in the race. Another Stepniak, Muscovite, a five-year-old gelding out of Alien, won the First Hack Handicap on the same day and took the Third Hack Handicap on Saturday. On the second day Menschikoff had a walk over in the Railway Handicap, and on the concluding day he easily beat Goldspur in the Wingatui Stakes.

On Monday afternoon Messrs F. Lawry, M.H.R., and Michael Foley, representing the Avondale Jockey Club, came before the committee of the Auckland Racing Club with a request that the suburban club might be allowed to hold its Autumn Meeting on the Ellerstie Racecourse on the ground that owing to the improvements and alterations being rather backward, a situation attributable to unavoidable circumstances, the Avondale course would not be ready by the time fixed for the meeting. After hearing Mr Lawry and Mr holey the committee decided to accede to the request.

Dreamland, the lightly-weighted winner of the Australian Cup, had not won a race until Tuesday since his two-year-old days He won the Maribyrnong Plate in handsome fashion, but afterwards was a conspicuous failure though well-backed on many occasions. The son of Trenton and Nightmare commenced his Turf career in 1893, so he is a pretty ancient warrior. He is trained by the ever victorious James Scobie.

The two recent purchases made by Mr John Brown, of Newcastle, in England have reached Sydney, and were on Tuesday taken from the steamer and placed in quarantine by Mr J. McGrath, of Fennelly's bazasr. One of them, a five year-old stallion, is named Trussing Cup, and is by Orme (the sire of Flying Fox) from Sterling Love, by See Saw from True Love, by Sterling. Sterling Love is the dam of Stirrup Cup, Wedding Bell, Kissing Cup, Sarchedon, and St Ilma. The other is a bay colt by Sir Hugo from Surefoot's dam by Galopin, from Miss Foot. The introduction of a stud horse by Orme, a prominent representative of the Ormond—Bend Or line is certain to be of great service in N.S.W., more especially as Trussing Cup, who was placed four times in England last season, is the only son of Orme in Australia. At the sale of the late Duke of Westminster's stud John Porter gave 9000 guineas for a yearling brother to Trussing Cup. The St Hugo colt is a brother to Sir Hercules, a good performer in England.

former in England. Advance travelled over to Australia carrying the extreme confidence of the majority of New Zialand sportsmen, who loyally supported the black colt both in the Newmarket Handicap and the Australian Cup. In both events he ran really well and upheld the high opinion formed of his capabilities. He was asked to accomplish tasks never before achieved by a four year-old. His weight in the Newmarket was 9st 11lb, and in the Cup 9st 7lb. No horse of his age ever won the Newmarket Handicap with nore than 9st 2lb on his back. That weight was carried by Fortunatus in 1893, but the heaviest impost (9st 31b) was carried by Bungebah, a five-year-old, in 1891. In the Australian Cup no four year-old has won with more than Sat 101b up. Portsea did this in 1893, and Malua in 1886, when six years olo, carried 9st 9lb and won. When we consider how many great horses have failed to win these races under lighter weights, we must acknowledge that Advance, by his forward running in both events, is entitled to be accounted with the best the Australasian Turf has produced. He has failed to win, certainly, but in the Newmarket and in the Cup he was always in the front rank, and he was certainly responsible for the pace set in the two mile and a quarter race. Advance has been beaten but he has not been disgraced. Ever since his arrival on the other side, writers there have doubted whether he could be got absolutely fit in the time. There may therefore be some consolation to his sup porters in this; he was not quite in perfect racing condition in either race. The three day's journey from Sydney to Melbourne would undoubtedly tend to fatten him inside, and as he has always been a hearty feeder, he would necessarily require a great deal of sharpening up to fit him for the stiff encounters he was asked to undertake. Melbourne critics thought the time was too short. and in all probability they were right. The many supporters of Advance can console themselves with the reflection that if Advance had arrived at Flemington one week earlier the results in the two big races of the VRC. Autumn Meeting might have been different—that is, if they have any need of consolation-for the Vanguard colt ran splendidly against the pick of Australia. Wakeful, on form, is entitled to be considered one of the best sprinters in Australasia. She is a four year old and carried 7st 6lb in the New Advance, one of her own age, conceded her 2st 5lb. In the Australian Cup, I reamland, an aged horse, carried 6st 12lb, 2st 9lb less than Advance had to bear. Dreamland can hardly be called a bad horse now, for his time was pretty good, but still, taking him as but a moderate, he was so advantageously treated that if Advance had won, his victory would have been of a phenomenal nature. It almost seems that the system of handicapping is wrong, for a good young horse is often asked to give impossible weights to older

horses of not much inferior quality.

THE DEFRAT OF ADVANCE.

A GREAT DAY FOR FAVOURITES.

There was a large attendance at Flemington on Saturday for the opening day of the V.B.C. Autumn Meeting, notwithstanding the extreme heat. Backers of favourites had a great day, for victory rested with the chosen of the public in each of the six races on the card After Dodons, by Padiock—Danæ, had won the Hopeful Stakes in good style in 1min 4\frac{1}{2}sec, the St Leger came up for decision. Of the three runners Finland was of course a hot favourite, his admirers laying 4 to 1 on his winning. Barbarossa was supported at 5 to 1, and The British Admiral had backers at 10 to 1. The Bill of Portland-Fishwife colt led for the early part of the race, but was headed at the six furlong mark. Once in the straight Finland challenged the leader, and quickly getting the best of the struggle, at the distance he drew away and won easily by two, lengths. The British Admiral guarded the rear some dozen lengths away. The field for the Newmarket Handicap numbered eighteen, and right up to the start Wakeful held her positi n. She started at 5 to 2, while Advance, about whom adverse reports were freely spoken in the morning, hardened to 9 to 2. The Watchdog was third favourite at 7 to 1, and Fulminate start d at 16 to 1. From a very fair start Epitome broke away with the lead, followed by The

Watchdog, Advance, and the favourite. At the half mile post Fulminate ran to the front, and at the entrance to the course proper Juggler momentarily joined the leader, with Advance and Wakeful in close attendance. Juggler retired almost directly, and Fulminate, Advance and Wakeful raced past the distance almost on terms. A fine race home ensued, but Wakeful had too much in hand for the others, and after a splendid finish the Trenton filly scored by nearly a length from Fulminate, with Advance only a neck behind the Gossoon mare. The time, 1min 15% sec, was much slower than was expected, for it was popularly supposed that the race would be won in snything under 1min 14:ec. 





ON SCOTCH WHISKY. So long ago as March, 1887, an interesting article on this subject appeared in the "Scotsman." It was supposed to

have been written by Mr D. P. McDonald, who was the originator of the now famous brand "Long John Whisky." He said, that in spite of bad times and the absence of money, and the strenuous exertions of Sir Wilfred Lawson to make us teetotallers, people will have something to drink, and among the spirits which are consumed, Scotch whisky holds, beyond all doubt, the premier position at the present moment. Yet, why should it be more popular than the potheen" of Ireland, the brandy of la belle France, or any other of those seductive fluids classified as alcoholic? That term itself at once suggests a question—why alcoholic? The name would almost imply that they were simply a mixture of alcohol and water. True, alcohol and water form the backbone of them all, but without the delicate flavour imparted by several other components, the greatest drunkard that ever drained a glass would wear the blue ribbon. It is worth while finding out what Scotch whisky really is. So far as the public know, there are generally two kinds—good and bad. As a matter of fact, there are two varieties manufactured, but they are not known as either good or bad, but bear the broad names of "Highland Malts" and "Raw Grains." There is, strictly speaking, a Malt" made, as the name indicates, in the southern counties, but this whisky, save in very few instances, is little better than the best raw grain spirit. We first take the Highland malt whisky, for without it Scotch whisky would be nonexistant. It is prepared, as the world knows, in the far away glens of the High-lands (purity of water being one of its essential requisites) from the very finest malt procurable. No other than this finest malt is used; and to assure its quality the distillers buy only the best barley they can procure, malt it under their own personal supervision, and as a rule, adopt measures of exceptional care in this important operation. It is at this stage that the peaty flavour so characteristic of a pure Highland whisky is obtained, the malt being kiln dried by Highland peat. The distinguishing property of malted grain is the amount of volatile ethers contained in the whisky

similar to the volatile matter in wine, improve and develop with age, possess a boquet and aroma of their own, and produce a peculiar dryness and fulness on the palate, which are, to say the least, attractive. On drinking a glass of pure, well-matured, old Highland whisky, the ethers which are present in it act at once on the heart, causing it to beat rapidly, creating a glow throughout the frame, exhilarating the individual, and generally producing that warmth and kindliness of feeling which has so frequently been associated with this questionable joy. The alcohol imbibed is not of sufficient quantity to have any appreciable effect, and the influence of the ethers on the heart's action passes off without leaving any unpleasant after effects. In fact, to adopt the familiar phrase, "There is not a headache in a hogshead of it," if a negative is the highest praise of pure Highland whisky.

This paper has now been enlarged by the addition of 10 pages. The first number published in January being full of substantial interesting information of interest to all classes in the Trade.

The new member for Camborne is now the new Sir Wilfred in the House of Commons, and he asks for a following of 5,000,000 teetotal citizens. "Lor," he exclaimed, "here's the sandwich I brought. You've eaten the check."

In order to give an impetus to the wine industry, the New South Wales Minster for Agriculture has granted £100 to the Royal Agricultural Society, to be offered as prizes for the best New South Wales wines exhibited at the coming show. The prizes are given for eight classes of wines, viz., red wine (suitable for export), clarets, hocks, port, sherry, muscat, red wine and white wine. The classes are open to growers and wine merchants alike. The wines must be the sole produce of New South Wales grapes, and free from any foreign substance. Three judges will be appointed, one by the Department, one by the society, while the third will be the viticultural expert.

I thought it was only a question of time and the women would discover something worse than drink in the world. Report says that great amusement has been caused in New York by a crusade against kissing, started by the local branch of the Women's Christian Temperence Union. Dr Anna Hadfield, lady physician, the leader of the new movement, says that kissing is a barbarous, masnitary custom, worse than drinking, and should be rigidly abolished. No person should kiss another without first using an antiseptic wash on the mouth to destroy bacteria. "As for the moral bacteria," she said, "that is even more dangerous. Girls are not taught to view a kiss with awe, as they once were. Engaged persons should be allowed only one kiss at the time of betrothal. Mothers of to-day are to blame for imbuing their children with the kissing vice. Many children are literally kissed to death. Kissing between women is quite as unwholesome. It is time to make war on kissing, and I am willing to go on record as firing the first gun."

At the Supreme Court Sir Robert Stout commented strongly on the practice of mining companies paying their men in cheques, thus, as he views it, placing temptation in the men's way of spending money in hotels, they having to re thereto to get the aforesaid cheques cashed. Sir Robert's sayings and remarks are like all roundabout attacks made on hotelkeepers, that is, they are not sufficiently to the point. Are we to infer, firstly, that a man cannot cash a cheque anywhere else than at an hotel, and secondly, if the man had cash in his pocket instead of a cheque that he will pass by the hotel. No doubt the mining companies will be deeply grateful to Sir Robert if he will only he can describe to rely the them the proper be good enough to point out to them the proper manner in which they should manipulate their pay sheets. Presumably it makes no difference to the mining companies as to how they pay the men. Also presumably, if the companies were to provide themselves with gold and silver to pay the men, and a robbery occured say on the night before pay day (as it has done more than once), we would have some equally sapient judge moralising on the folly of keeping (also the temptation offered) of such large sums of money in offices. The companies cannot afford to give and the men cannot afford to take a half holiday say fortnightly, to enable the latter to journey into the nearest banking township to cash their cheques. From my knowledge of the Trade and of mining communities, gained in each respective way by personal contact, I should unhesitatingly affirm that payment by cheque is a safeguard against the recipients thereof spending their money too freely. However it is now up to Sir Robert to give us a remedy.

The instructions given to the Royal Commission, in England, which has been set up to inquire into the alleged beer poisoning are as follows:—To ascertain with respect to England and Wales: I. The amount of recent exceptional sickness and deuth attributable to poisoning by arsenic. 2. Whether such exceptional sickness and death have been due to arsenic in beer, or in other articles of food or drink, and, if so (a) To what extent (b) By what ingredients or in what manner the arsenic was conveyed, and (o) In what way any such ingredients became arsenicated. 3. If it is found that exceptional sickness and death have been due to arsenic in beer, or in other articles of food or drink, by what safeguards the introduction of arsenic therein can be prevented.

"From Greenland's icy mountains"—a place where, not only in the winter, but all the year round, a glass of Peter Heering's cherry brandy would be acceptable—there comes a statement via "The Danish Export Roview," that the natives are never permitted to purchase a single drop of spirits. The entire trade of this vast country—imports and exports—is controlled by officials sent from Copenhagen, and only Government vessels are allowed to sail in Greenland waters. According to our contemporary, "it is purely out of humane reasons, and having in view exclusively the welfere of the native inhabitants, that the monopoly of the trade is maintained, and that Greenland is preserved as a 'closed' country." For 780 miles on the west coast foreign vessels are excluded, and even Danish skippers are not permitted to touch there without express permission of their own Government. Pity the sorrows of the poor Esquimaux!

The difference between moderation, i.e., temperance, and fanatical denunciation of alcohol has recently been aptly dealt with by a Swiss pastor, who first of all points out that certain associations which, some 20 or 30 years ago, began operations as temperance societies, have now degenerated, under the influence of fanatical members, into total abstinence bands, although it cannot for a moment be assumed that all or the majority of their "moderate" members have found reasonable indusgence in alcoholic beverages so injurious as to lead them to renounce the same entirely. The attitude of the total abstinence "forwards" he attributes to their presumed conviction that, since drunkenness is a vice that should be avoided, the less one drinks the greater one's virtue; consequently, he who dispenses with alcohol entirely must be the most virtuous under the sun. Without going into the religious aspect of the question save to remark that the founder of Christianity not only praised the faithful vine but also partook of its produce on various occasions—which should suffice to dispose of the alleged "sinfullness" of wine drinking—the worthy pastor goes on to point out that the "kindly fruits of the earth" are meant to be enjoyed by mankind, and that we who inhabit a region well endowed with these fruits should utilise the benefits at our disposal, whereas, according to the abstinence dogma, these valuable products should be wasted.

According to a note in the monthly bulletin of the Bureau of American Republics, the industrial policy of the Mexican Government, as directed against fostering all branches of internal development, has included measures for the improvement of the class of beer brewed in the Republic. With this end in view the best varieties of hops have been imported, and have been planted in suitable localities, yielding good crops. It is intended that these hop gardens shall not only render Mexico independent, to a great extent, of foreign imports, but shall also tend to provide a cheap and agreeable substitute for the national drink of the country, "pulque," which, owing to the large quantity of alcohol contained therein, is regarded as deleterious to the health of the inhabitants. There are at present sixteen breweries in the Republic, none of them having been in existence more than a few years. One of these establishments, at Monterry, is quoted as occupying the first rank among the industries of the city. It has an actual capital of 2,060,000 pesos, and all the apparatus and machinery are of the most modern types used in Germany and the United States, and the capacity of production is about eight hundred hectolitres (11,600 gallons) a day.

A good many of the Highland distillers have visited Leith during the past month. The opinions expressed by them as to the prospects of the present season vary somewhat, but the general opinion seems to be that filling orders are fairly plentiful in view of the whole circumstances. The fortunate distillers who find a ready market for their product think that prospects are better than at this time last season, and are hopeful that with a further restriction of the production, the trade will soon right itself The less fortunate men, however, find selling The less fortunate men, however, and sening orders very searce, and are not looking forward very hopefully to the immediate future. Some distillers say they have done very well in Glasgow. There is no doubt that a further reduction of the output this season is imperative, and there is every reason to believe that the more thoughtful distillers recognise this, and are endeavouring to see that it is given effect to Reports from the North point to the conclusion that distillers are in no hurry to commence operations, while it is said that some places will close down early in the year It would be the height of folly to make any considerable quantity of whisky for what is known as "posterity," and it is obviously better to close down than to go on piling up stocks for which there is no outlet. Everthing points to a serious reduction in distillers' profits this season, and altogether the prospects for the immediate future of the industry are not bright. Some of the company reports recently issued disclosed a very depressing state of affairs, and a futher restriction of the output, with a phenomenal curtailment of profits, is not likely to improve matters.—"Distillers' Magazine."

In the Te Awamutu Magistrate's Court last Friday, before Mr Northcroft, John Ormsby was convicted on a charge of being the occupier of an unlicensed house where liquor was sold. Ofmsby's barmaid, Ngapawa, was also convicted of selling liquor without: a license on the 2nd February. One charge against Ormsby, and one against Ngapawa, were dismissed. The defendant Ormsby has applied in all the charges against him for unlawfully selling liquor to have the same treated as indictable under the Indicable Ofiences Summary Jurisdiction Act, 1900, and this is being done. The Magistrate has not yet stated what punishment he is going to inflict. Mr A. A. Blair appeared for the prosecution, and Mr A. Swabrick for the defence.

An important decision, under the Licensing Act, was given yesterday week at Christchnroh, by Judge Denniston, in banco, in an appeal against the decision of the Stipendiary Magistrate. The latter dismissed an information against an hotelkeeper for supplying more than one drink to bona-fide travellers to New Brighton on a Sunday. The persons supplied arrived at one arms to bone inderess to New Brighton on a Sunday. The persons supplied arrived at eleven in the morning, and had three drinks at intervals during the day, the last being at four p.m. The Magistrate found that they were persone under the Act of 1895, arriving from a persons under the Act of 1895, arriving from a journey, and dismissed the information. The Judge held the Magistrate was wrong in dismissing the case, the intention of the Legislature being that travellers should satisfy the thirst inpenng that travellers should satisfy the thirst induced by a journey, but not thirst induced by sojourn at the place to which they had journeyed. He upheld the appeal with costs. This case excited considerable interest in Christohurch The Licensed Victuallers Association of that city took the matter up and engaged counsel to oppose the appeal.

On the 21st February, at the Supreme Court Christchurch, before His Honour Mr Justice Denniston, Edward Carroll, hotelkeeper, late of the Imperial Hotel, claimed for specific performances, inquiries, etc., £500 damages from Richard John Whittle, licensee of the Masonic Hotel, Christchurch. The statement of claim's set forth that the defendant had entered into a written agreement with E. W. Roper, merchant and commission agent, to the effect that Roper should obtain a purchaser for the lease and goodwill of the Masonic Hotel. Roper had secured the plaintiff as a purchaser on the conditions set forth in the agreement, viz., £1500 for the lease, goodwill and stock in trade, and had entered, as goodwill and stock in trade, and had entered, as the defendant's agent, into an agreement with him. After the completion of the sale the defendant had refused to give up possession, and had denied the agreement, whereof the plaintiff sought to obtain judgment for specific perfor-mances of the sale of the lesse and goodwill and for £500 damages, occasioned by the loss of trade to plaintiff, he having sold out of the Imperial Hotel to take over the Masonic Hotel, and thus lost the profits of a busy season. For the defence it was stated that defendant denied that on or about November 26, 1900, or at any other time, he had entered into an agreement in writing or otherwise with the plaintiff or anyone on his behalf to sell the lease to the plaintiff, together with the goodwill and stock-in-trade. He further denied that he had agreed to a sale, or that he had authorised E. W. Roper to sign the same as his agent. For a further defense it was stated that at the time of the alleged agreement, viz., November 26, 1900, any authority Roper might have had to sell (which defendant denied) had been revoked and cancelled. After lengthy about November 26, 1900, or at any other time, had been revoked and cancelled. After lengthy evidence on both sides the case was adjourned to allow plaintiff time to procure further evidence.
