Aruake Pleasing Track Watchers— Antarctic a Probable Starter at Trentham—Wanganui J.C.'s Successful Season.

MONDAY, June 8. Aruake has been nominated for the hurdle events at the Hawke's Bay Winter Meeting, and if the weights are suitable will be taken across either next Saturday or on the Monday. The Chasseur gelding has been pleasing the touts by the good work he has been doing recently, and it looks as if he would be at the top of his form next week. He was given a turn over the schooling hurdles on Saturday, when he gave a good exhibition of jumping, and finished up at the end of a couple of rounds in capital style.

Gondolier has not been doing any jumping recently, but he appears to be very well, and unless anything untoward happens will fulfil his engagements at the Hawke's Bay and Napier Park meetings. He jumps the big country well when going at threequarter pace, but it remains to be seen whether he is equal to winning a big steeplechase. Still, there has been nothing startling shown by the steeplechasers this season, and unless Bercola, Glenmore, and one or two others improve very considerably Gondolier will not need to be a champion to win a race or two over the big sticks.

It is quite evident that Glenmore and Kauroa are not nearly so good this season as they were last. Probably the former had a bit too much of it last season, and this may account for his poor form so far. His trainer, however, was very confident prior to the Wanganui meeting that he would win a race or two with the pair mentioned at the Wanganui and Auckland meetings, while Waterworks was also expected to score. Maybe, by the time the Wellington and C.J.C. meetings come round Glenmore will

have improved, but so far his displays have been very disappointing to his connections.
