BELGIAN REFUGEE FOOD FUND.

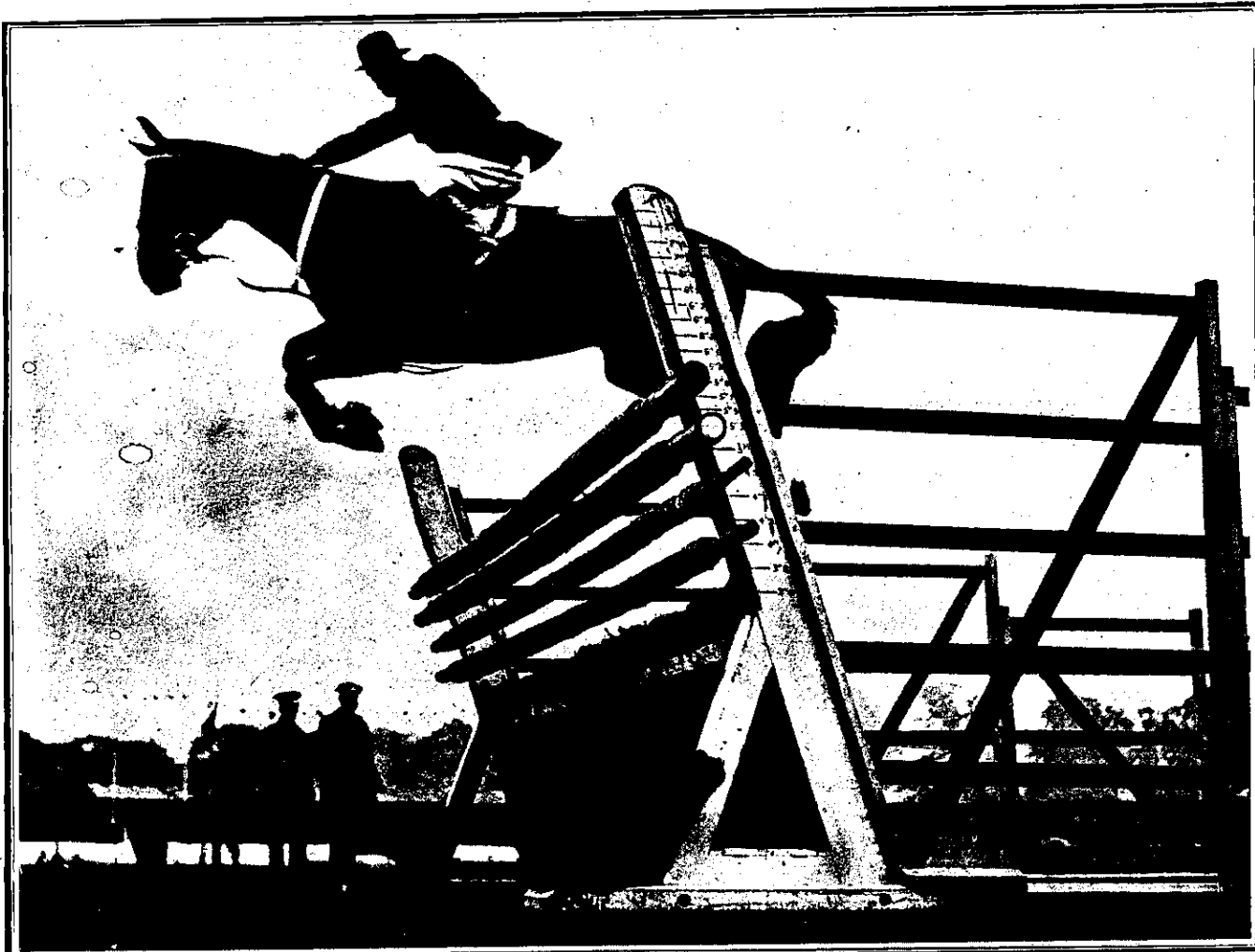
A DESERVING APPEAL.

Mr. G. W. Sellar, hon. secretary of the Belgian Refugee Food Fund, whose address is Perry Street, Masterton, forwards a deserving request that we should again bring to the notice of our readers the needs of this worthy institution. The heroism of the brave Belgian people in the early stages of the war, when their country was ruthlessly invaded by the tyrannical Germans, constitutes one of the greatest sacrifices in connection with the cruel European campaign, and the fact that despite the wholesale distress and sufferings of the inhabitants of Belgium their brave soldiers are still taking a noble part in waging war upon the hateful Hun forms a striking example of the courage of this much-oppressed nation. That the noble sacrifices made by the Belgian race have received recognition in New Zealand is apparent by the whole-hearted support accorded the Belgian Refugee Food Fund, but there still remains urgent need for further help being given to the inhabitants of this sorely-distressed country. By rendering every assistance that lies in their power, our readers will be performing one of the most deserving actions possible in alleviating the sufferings and poverty that exists everywhere in Belgium, and we appeal to one and all to forward donations (however small) to the hon. secretary, Box 54, Masterton, or through any branch of the Bank of Australasia.

As showing the commendable work accomplished in helping the Belgians, it is necessary to mention that the New Zealand branch of the Belgian Refugee Food Fund has since the beginning of the war sent to the headquarters in London the following cash and provisions:—

- 1521 carcasses of mutton.
- 10,566lb. of beef.
- 11,200lb. of jam.
- 141 boxes butter.
- 118 crates of cheese and
- £900 cash, including £300 to Baby's Milk Fund.

The N.Z. branch has also undertaken to supply 200 sheep per month, and as their funds are running low they reluctantly make another appeal to the public to enable them to keep up their meat supply. The branch is instrumental in helping to feed some thousands of destitute Belgians, and wish, if possible, to keep up their supplies until the end of the war.

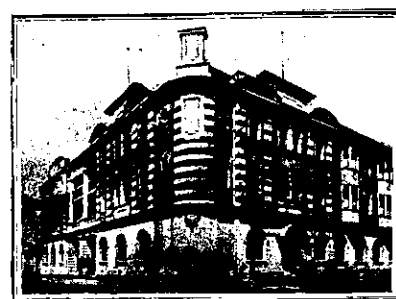
