Professor and Mrs. Gabbatt, of Cashmere Hills, Canterbury, leave for England shortly to spend a long vacation in the Old Country.

According to a statement recently made by Lord Sandhurst, there are 25,000 Russian subjects of military age in the United Kingdom.

A sum of £20,000 from Zanzibar for war expenses has been gratefully accepted by the Government; £10,000 was given last year.

Up to August 18, 206,661 people had visited the German submarine mine-layer UC5 at the Temple Pier, on the River Thames, and over £3000 had been received.

In passing a resolution of sympathy with the widow of Captain Fryatt, the Committee of Lloyds' placed on record their sense of the brutality of the crime of the German Government.

The Fourth of August was commemorated in France at the back of the front by a solemn ceremony at the military cemetery where so many of our heroes rest. Homage was paid to our dead by placing beautiful wreaths on the graves of the 1500 Britishers buried there.

More than two thousand jaded tribunals in England are still struggling with a mass of appeals against military service. Their members are wondering when, if ever, the stream of applications is to cease, and vainly hoping for some relief from the Government. It is believed that over 300,000 appeals are still pending.

There were, according to Lloyd's Register, 440 merchant ships, of 1,540,218 tons gross, under construction in the United Kingdom on June 30, an increase of about 33,000 tons on a year ago.

The Berlin "Vossische Zeitung" says that the stoppage of the shipping of Indian jute killed the Bremen linoleum industry directly after the British trade had been captured.

The Drapers' Company has given 50 guineas to the Trustees and Guardians of Shakespeare's Birthplace, whose revenues are less than the working expenses, owing to the decrease in visitors' fees.


