Serious Accident on Riccarton Tracks —H. Gray's Success at Wingatui— Rose Pink Shapes Well—Linden Changes Hands.

(Telegraph-Christchurch Correspondent)

When being exercised at Riccarton on Saturday afternoon the two-year-olds Nantville and Favorita collided with disastrous results. Both horses and their riders came to grief, while the lads, B. Lansdown and J. Patterson, were removed to the hospital in an unconscious condition. According to latest accounts their condition is still dangerous, especially in regard to Lansdown, who remains unconscious. Both horses were badly knocked about, and it will be some time before they are fit to work again.

Most of the Riccarton horses that raced at Wingatui are back home again. From now till Cup time there will be plenty of interesting work at headquarters.

The North Island horseman Hector Gray was in good form at the Dunedin meeting, where four successes came his way.

Of all the New Zealand Cup horses seen out at Wingatui, Rose Pink shaped best. In the Ranfurly Handicap on Saturday she met with considerable interference half a mile from home, and then only suffered defeat by half a length. As she will have 26lb. less to carry in the Cup. everything points to the Kilbroney mare putting up a great race.

Though Nocturnal accounted for both hurdle races at the Dunedin meeting, the weakness of the opposi-tion discounted his performances. The half-brother to Noctui orm has been given a nomination in the Auckland Cup, but there is little chance of his going to the post.

During the progress of the Dunedin meeting Linden was purchased by Mr. Hugo Friedlander, and will in future form one of C. Giesler's team at Wingatui.

Though Margerine and Killard failed rather badly at Wingatui, both can be expected to strip in greatly improved form when saddled up for the New Zealand Cup.

Rorke's Drift had every chance in the Ranfurly Handicap, but failed to put much heart into his finish. doubt the two races he had at Wingatui will improve the gelding's prospects, as he always requires a good deal of sharpening up.

The death has to be recorded this week of the well-known Ellershie trainer, P. Jones, who had a paralytic seizure on Sunday week and succumbed on Tuesday at 7.30 a.m. The deceased was one of the long-time trainers in the province, and was quite an institution at Ellershie. He first became prominent in his profession as the trainer of those great ponies Moment and Antic, and had such horses as Highlander and Romeo through his hands later on, and prepared El Gallo for Mr. W. J. Ralph when that horse won the Great Northern Hurdle and Steeplechase double two years in succession. Indeed, many useful horses were turned out of his stables, and at the time of his death he had a fairly large team under his care, including Colonel Soult and Bedford (winner of the last C.J.C. Winter Cup). The genial "Paddy" will be missed at the meetings about Auckland, but nowhere more so than at the racecourse side and where brother trainers and sports were accustomed to congregate. His funeral was announced to take place on Wednesday. His parents were buried in the Hamilton cemetery and there the remains of their son were to be interned.
