The committee of the Auckland Racing Club have had under consideration the Julius totalisator, the latest invention in the matter of automatic dispensers of odds. Experts who have inspected the new machine, which is said to be able to issue 118 tickets per minute, while admitting that it is a very ingenious invention, are divided in their opinions as to whether it is suited to racecourses. However, it is understood that the question of adopting it at Ellerslie will be considered by the Auckland Racing Club Committee at an early date.

Attention is called to an advertisement in this issue announcing that on Wednesday, July 20, Mr. Newton King, acting under instructions from Mrs. Stewart McGuinness, will sell by auction at her farm, Mangaraka, Waitara West, the thoroughbred mare Lady Fisher, with foal at foot by Feild Bat-tery and stinted to Field Battery. Lady Fisher is well known as the dam of that speedy horse Maniopoto, who left a mile and a-half behind in the A.J.C. Metropolitan Handicap in 1905 in 2.32½. Her yearling colt by Birkenhead sold at the sales in Sydney recently realised 700 guineas. The sale is advertised to take place at 2 p.m.

Acceptances for the C.J.C. Grand National Hurdles, Steeplechase and Winter Cup fall due to-morrow evening at 8 p.m. .

On Saturday last nominations for the positions of president and vicepresident and for five seats on the committee of the Auckland Racing Club closed. The Hon. E. Mitchelson was re-elected president and Mr. H. T. Gorrie vice-president. The following were nominated for the committee:-Messrs. G. W. S. Patterson, H. O. Nolan, S. Bradley, W. Davies, F. Earl and O. Nicholson.

The rule relating to fixed penalties has been discussed so often that it would only be a waste of space to write further upon the subject. How absurd it is was emphasised at the Gisborne meeting, where Paisano beat two very moderate performers in Sabre and Whakaweira and earned a 5lb penalty. Actually speaking, Paisano only beat Sabre, as Whakaweira fell.

Wimmera was scratched for the Grand National Hurdle race at 4 p.m. on Thursday last.

The death is reported from the Waikato of the stallion Muskapeer at the age of 27 years. Muskapeer met with an accident as a youngster and never sported silk. He was bought by the well-known veterinary surgeon, Mr. J. Brown, when three years old, and remained his property throughcut. Muskapeer sired some really good horses, the most notable of whom was Lottie, winner of the Auckland Cup in 1894.

Of those figuring in the Wellington Steeplechase, Te Arai and Kiatere have each previously won the event.

The names were reduced to four-Messrs Noble (Recfton), Doogan (Greymouth), Shannon (Wellington), and Gibbs (Gore). The final ballot was between Messrs. Noble and Doogan, the latter receiving the support of the Grey Club with 18 votes, and Mr. Noble of the other four clubs, with 32 votes. Mr. Noble was then appointed for the year.

It appears that the weights for the New Zealand Grand National Hurdle Race were not published in Gisborne last Thursday, so that when Paisano was started in the Hurdle Race his owner was not aware of the fact that a win would mean a penalty for the Grand National Hurdles. The horse has not incurred a penalty at Trentham, and will carry 10.10 in the Winter Hurdles. It is understood that his owner has protested to the Canterbury Jockey Club concerning the Grand National weights being declared early, and not being published in Gisborne.

Grafnax, who won the V.R.C. Grand National Steeplechase on Saturday, fell when looking all over a winner in the event last year.

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Vernier, with 11st 11lb, is top weight in the Australian Hurdle Race, for which event Ataahua has been awarded 10st 11lb. For the Austra-lian Steeplechase Bribery heads the list with 13st 5lb, Ataahua being weighted at 11st 9lb.

The registration committee of the West Australian Jockey Club recently questioned several jockeys as to why they had not been in the habit of riding work at Ascot. It was further suggested that those who did not sign the attendance book with sufficient frequency prior to August 1 might find themselves without a license at the commencement of next season. The club is also credited with adopting a recommendation that all unmarried jockeys must obtain employment in racing stables.
